WAR NEWS!

NEW YORK, June 1.—A dispatch from Lisbon says that the Spanish are sending troops from all provinces to Cadiz and along the coast. The intentions are to dispatch them to the Philippines as soon as the squadron is ready to convey them.

CAPE HAITEN, June 1.—According to a dispatch from a Spanish source, fourteen American warships and two torpedo boats were engaged in combat at Santiago de Cuba, at 3 p. m. Cannonading was heard at sea and it is said an engagement between American and Spanish fleets was in progress.

Dewey still holds Manila. Another American squadron left today for Antonia, on the north coast of the island.

MADRID, June 1.—The minister of marine has received a dispatch saying that the American squadron suffered a check at the harbor of Santiago from the fire of the Spanish fleet and forts, and had to retire damaged. He claims that the Spanish fleet did not suffer.

PORT AU PRINCE, June 1.—The American ships under Commodore Schley began the bombardment of the forts at Santiago at 2 o'clock yesterday afternoon. The ships used their heaviest guns silencing the forts in two hours. The United States torpedo boat, Poster, arrived at this port at 1 o'clock this morning with dispatches for Washington.

PORT AU PRINCE, June 2.—The American squadron which left Santiago water at 4 p. m. yesterday returned this morning and fired two shots believed to be signals to the insurgents to plant 3,000 troops near the city. The attention is absorbed in the condition of the Bank of Spain, which is considered worse than any reverse of war, inasmuch as the impossibility of the Bank of Spain to raise sufficient means makes it impossible to continue the war.

WASHINGTON, June 2.—The administration fears the finances of Spain will put a sudden end to the war, and is therefore anxious to land troops and take possession of the islands of Spain. Official notice given says that troops will be landed as soon as possible in Porto Rico and Cuba.

A special to the Journal says the troop ship Alfonso XIII, with troops and coal on board, was captured by the auxiliary cruiser, St. Paul, Monday.

LONDON, June 2.—A mob of Spaniards stoned Major-General Richard, of the artillery, of Gibraltar, while he was walking near Gibraltar.

CAPE HAITEN, June 2.—A special from Santiago, confirming yesterday's bombardment, says a great event is expected hourly there, as the American war ships are in front of the harbor, and the insurgents are gathering on the hills. The Spaniards have taken extraordinary precaution to guard their harbor entrance.

WASHINGTON, June 2.—The navy department says not a word has been received of Schley's engagement at Santiago. A report is hourly expected. The attack was made to ascertain the number of vessels in the harbor.

NEW YORK, June 2.—A Port au Prince special reports that the American fleet has again attacked Santiago and 3,000 insurgents are attacking the city on the land side.

THAT HOG LAW.

That hog law that you will be called upon to decide for or against at this election reads as follows:

Section 3416. On the petition of one hundred or more legal voters of any county in this state being filed with the county clerk before the time of giving notice of the general election in any year, the county clerk shall cause notice to be given that at such election a vote will be taken in such county for and against swine running at large.

Sec. 3417. In voting for and against swine running at large, it shall be printed or written on the same ballot with candidates for county officers, and shall read, "For running at large—Yes," or "For running at large—No," and the votes thus cast shall be canvassed the same as those cast for any county officer.

Sec. 3418. If a majority of all the votes cast shall be against swine running at large, the county clerk shall give notice, by publication in some newspaper in his county for three consecutive weeks, that in sixty days from the date of said notice it will be unlawful for swine to run at large, under penalty of \$5 for the first offense, and \$10 for each and every subsequent offense, to be recovered from the owner of the swine by civil action in the name of the state of Oregon, before a justice of the peace of the precinct in which owner or keeper, or either of them, may reside; and such penalty shall be for the benefit of, and when collected paid into, the common-school fund of the county in which said action is brought, within sixty days after such amount is proved to be at large.

Sec. 3419. No prosecution shall be commenced to recover the penalties named in section 3418 until at least one day's notice has been given to the owner or person having charge of such swine, if such owner or keeper be known; and it shall be a sufficient defense to such prosecution to show that such animal or animals were at large without the knowledge of such owner or keeper, and without his fault.

A person finding any swine running at large contrary to the provisions of this act, and any constable of any precinct or marshal of any city of his county where such swine may be found, on view or information, shall take up and confine the same forthwith, giving notice thereof to the owner, if known, and if not known, by posting notices, describing such animals therein, in at least three public places within the precinct; and if the owner does not appear and claim his property and pay all charges for taking up, advertising, and keeping the same within ten days from the date of this notice, the sale of the animal or animals will be proceeded with under the law relating to strays.
