SAN FRANCISCO, June 7.—The Baltimore arrived at Honolula May 29th. She had a very pleasant voyage and all are well. Nothing is too good for Uncle Sam's sailors.

SAN FRANCISCO, June 8 .- The monitor, Monterey, passed through the Golder Gate yesterday, probably never to return. All crafts afloat gave her a great send off.

WASHINGTON, June 8.—The war department does not deny that troops have sailed from Tampa. It is believed that the bombardment at Santiago was to prepare the way for the invaders known to be already enronte. Forts at the entrance are completely silenced, according to a dispatch from Sampson.

WASHINGTON, June 8.—Dewey has a serious problem to fight in Manila's insurgent leaders.

LONDON, June 8.—Russia virtually admits the American possession of the Philippines.

SAN FRANCISCO, June 8.—The government is weary of delay. for remissness in past years. It will press into service any steamers it choses for the purpose of carrying troops to Manila. Her Wonderful Performance and Its Use As an Object Lesson.

It was no common incident, this voyage of the Oregon, achieved in no common manner, and its record reflects no common credit upon the American navy.

reflects discredit upon our government What is the Oregon? And what has she done? It is a heavy coast-line battleship. It is intended for giving and takcountry. It is not intended for swift ornising in distant sens. Yet the latter was what it was called upon to do. It was ordered to hasten "from lands of to lands of sun, through two oceans and three zones, past more than a dozen way around the world, through distress

of tropic heat and through perils of Antarctic storms; through peril, too, of attack from bostile fleets; and at the end of the arduous voyage to be in full fighting trim, ready for instant action. It was a commission that might well be deemed trying to any vessel that was ever launched. But it fulfilled it to the letter. After all the perils and labors of 13,000 miles, through strange waters, it reaches its station shead of expected strained, nor the stroke of a hammer nor the turn of a wrench needen to prepare finer tribute to shipbuilding and seaman ahip to all the world than in that simple

fact, we should like to know where it is. But what a stupendous object lesson formance! Thousands of miles of sai ing, with the innumerable perils of sea and shore, and weeks of time, of which of a nation's life-and all for what? All because for 50 years we have failed to the enterprise of our intelligence, and have not cut a canal across the isthumus of Central America. Had such a canal been out, the Oregon would have been in West Indian waters more than a mouth ago. What would not that have been worth to us? What might it not have been worth?
