WAR NEWS!

HAVANA, June 10.—It is officially denied that Santiago was bombarded today.

The American warships today bombarded Baiquire at some distance east of Aquadore, and near Santiago de Cuba. A dispatch from Cape Henry June 10th says four Spanish warships are lurking in the vicinity of the cape.

SANTIAGO, June 10.—There are 20,000 infantry here. The guns of Cervera's fleet have been landed and fortifications have been made to give the American troops a hot reception.

WASHINGTON, June 10.—Assistant secretary of war, Minkley, says the expedition for Manila will leave today. It will consist of 6,000 men and large quantities of supplies.

SAN DIEGO, Cal., June 10.—The monitor Monterey and Terror Brutus, put in here today. On their way the Monterey lost several hundred tons of coal loaded on the deck, and came in to get more.

WASHINGTON, June 10.—Thirty-four transports conveyed by sixteen warships of which the battleship, Indiana, is leader, will probably leave Tampa today. The transports will carry 2,500 troops, tons of ammunition, fruit and supplies for the army of invaders.

WASHINGTON, June 13.—One division of the United States troops sailed this morning from Key West, consisting of nearly 15,000 officers and men. The transports are under a strong convoy of warships.

A London dispatch says: Three Spanish cruisers have arrived at Manila and Dewey's fleet has gone to meet and fight them.

WASHINGTON June 14.—Preparations for the second expedition of troops to the West Indies is being pushed rapidly. It will start soon on transports.

CHICAGO, June 14.—Joe Leiter, the speculator, has failed, resulting in lower prices for a time.

Sagasta's private secretary says: Spain is anxious for peace, and will accept any suggestion to that end which does not come from America.

The American's advance guard, whom it was feared was killed or captured in fighting near Santiago, is safe and is back in the line.

A mail report of the battle of Manila from Dewey has reached Washington. He tells of Americans taking possession of ports and fighting the guns. They sailed to help the Americans fight near Manila which in part was responsible for the four jives lost in the recent engagement.

The American forces in Cuba are suffering from heat and poor water.

GRANT COUNTY NEWS. From the Long Creek Eagle. J. A. Crisman departed Tuesday for Heppner with wool. He will return with freight for Long Creek merchants.

Ruel Rounds and Rescoe Shaw arrived from Heppner Saturday loaded to the guards with freight for Long Creek merchants.

Michael Yriberry, a sheepman of Basin creek, was in Long Creek Tuesday. He will market his wool this season at Heppner.

Harvey county has been in existence since 1888, nearly ten years, and to date it has not paid a dollar of its own indebtedness. All the money raised in that county for several years to come will be paid Grant county as the price of its liberty.

Wyatt Patnam, the little boy who was accidentally shot through the body on Wednesday of last week, has wonderfully improved and is now almost certain to recover. From the position of the wounds in the child's breast and back, it seems impossible that the bullet could have missed the heart, and it is a miracle that he is going to get well.

Oliver, who shot and killed Peter French, of Harney county, was promptly acquitted when on trial for manslaughter. Yet the muttonhead who wields the editorial pen on the Oregonian thought it was a disgrace that he was let out on bonds after the affair happened.

Had Oliver been a wealthy man the Oregonian would have viewed the matter through entirely different glasses. It's a shame and a disgrace when so great a daily as the Oregonian can't play anything but the part of a "poodle" when a millionaire is in trouble.

The souvenir edition of the Baker City Morning Democrat has reached this office and is very neat and well arranged, it consisting of forty-six pages. It contains a well written account of the mining, farming and lumbering, stockraising and fruit-growing industries of Baker, Grant, Harney, Malheur and Union counties, and also a vast fund of information concerning that section of Oregon, as well as numerous notes of business establishments, mines, residences and representative men of the above-named counties.

The mining interests of Grant county received particular mention, and taking the edition as a whole it is a valuable advertisement of the resources of Eastern Oregon.

From Lake Bennett. The caption should read, "From Lake Bennett, via Iowa," but lack of space prevents so extensive a heading and at the same time preserve those symmetrical proportions that printers insist upon.

What the Gazette desires to say is that Mrs. E. J. Muir writes from Iowa that she has heard at numerous times from her, the last time from Lake Bennett where he was waiting with a thirty-foot boat for the ice to break. He is accompanied by the William boys, of Iowa. He gives a thrilling account of the avalanche at Chilhowee Pass which came dangerously near catching her. He is assailed in digging out the bodies. In a very short time he will have reached the busy shores of Klondike, and it is hoped, will come back with a fortune.

Highly Prosperous Section, With Heavy Coming Crops. From the Oregonian. Quite a number of Heppner people are in Portland at present, some for change and pleasure, some for business and some as delegates to the Masonic convention.

Last year, Morrow county produced 800,000 bushels of wheat, for which the growers received an average of 65 cents per bushel, and many of them received 80 cents. This year the county will produce 1,000,000 bushels.

In cattle, everything in Eastern Oregon is in demand, and anything will bring 3 1/2 cents, live weight. T. A. Rhea has just shipped 500 head of beef cattle to Omaha, and recently shipped 750 head to Chicago. A bunch of feed steers were recently sold at Echo at 4 1/2 cents per pound and shipped to Seattle.

At Heppner, yearling steers bring \$18, beefers \$15 and range cows and calves \$25. Horses have become themselves again, and are scarce, and ordinary saddle animals bring from \$25 to \$50. Work horses, sold to sheepmen for \$50 to \$75. Two years ago these horses found no sale at \$3 a head. One of the Heppner merchants has been trying for six months to get an extra good saddle horse, and offers \$100 for such.

In sheep, Charles White has shipped from Heppner to Chicago a trainload of mutton sheep, and Ed Weydert has shipped to Livingston, Mont., 6,500 head of ewes and lambs, paying \$1.50 for the lambs and \$2 for the ewes. Mutton sheep are now worth about \$2.55 a head at Heppner.

In wool, the opening up of the market is still lagging. Buyers are at Heppner who would probably pay 7 to 10 cents, but growers are holding for 10 to 15 cents, according to quality.

Arthur Minor is a member of a Heppner mercantile house which is among the first of the state, and says that business is now better than ever, and will increase when the interior trade comes in and ranchers haul their wool into Heppner.
