SEES A PHANTOM.

The Oregonian sees the phantom of Mitchell in everything. It says in a recent issue:

The appointment by President McKinley of Jay P. Lucas, of Gilliam county, as register of the land office at The Dalles, and Otis Patterson, as receiver of the same office, is a distinct recognition of the claims of ex-Senator Mitchell.

Patterson was chairman and Lucas assistant temporary secretary of the rump congressional convention which the Mitchellites, headed by Charles H. Carey, attempted to set up at Astoria in April, and which they abandoned only when they saw that it would die a bornin'.

The Oregonian tells the truth by accident, only, if ever at all. If it has an interest in telling a plain, bareface falsehood, it can do it handsomely.

Mr. Mitchell had nothing to do with the appointments mentioned. Lucas and Patterson were the choice of Oregon's delegation. That is the whole story. But if Mr. Mitchell had seen fit to have endorsed the new land office appointees, they would have interposed no objection.

It is an honor to have the indorsement of a republican who has some respect for party ethics, and this trait of character does not belong to Harvey Scott. He boasts that he is a bolter, when things do not meet his approval.

The Gazette has no desire to discuss the matter of the organization of the congressional convention at Astoria with a man who is too bull-headed and selfish to be either fair or honest.

The thing is past and the nominee of that convention is elected. That is enough. But Harvey Scott never was satisfied with anything but "rule or ruin".

And when he runs out of subjects over which to be stinking mean and perverse, he howls "John H. Mitchell". If half the truth has been told, he should look upon the ex-senator as a benefactor rather than an enemy, for if the Gazette has it straight Mr. Mitchell kept Harvey Scott from being punished for a crime that would have lauded him in the penitentiary.

IT WILL be refreshing to see the Oregonian paw the air over the appointment of Senator Patterson. A MAN who bolts his party nominees should expect no favors at the hands of his party.

MALCOLM and Burkhardt, contestants for the recordership of Multnomah county, have hit upon a novel way of settling their difficulty. They divide the salary of the office equally, one acting as recorder and the other his deputy.

THE expulsion of Belts, the secretary of the British consulate, from Porto Rico, and his maltreatment and imprisonment in a dungeon, will doubtless get Queen "Vic" after the Dons. They have a bigger job now than they can get away with, and it now seems that they are courting entire obliteration from the face of the earth.

THE appointment of Hon. I. L. Patterson to the office of collector of customs for the district of Willamette is splendid recognition of an excellent republican. This will doubtless remind the Oregonian that "This is distinct recognition of the claims of ex-Senator Mitchell," as Mr. Patterson was one of Marion county's senators that stood by Mr. Mitchell to the very last, at the last session of the legislature. The newly appointed collector of customs has the best wishes of the Heppner Gazette.

WHILE the second congressional district of Oregon was fortunate in electing the republican candidate for congress, representing as he does the principles of the republican party enunciated at St. Louis and at Astoria, yet the whole state should be doubly thankful over the return of Hon. WAR NEWS!

VIENNA, June 14.—The New Free Press says: Spain requests that the powers occupy Manila and not allow the insurgents to do so.

WASHINGTON, June 14.—Official information has reached here that the transports with troops for Santiago, supposed to have left yesterday for Cuba, had not sailed up to an early hour this morning. No reasons are given for the unexpected delay. Officials decline to discuss the matter.

WASHINGTON, June 15.—The Hawaiian resolution passed the house today, 209 to 91.

American marines and Cubans completely routed a large force of Spaniards yesterday. One American was slightly wounded. The Spaniards lost 40 killed. This fight occurred near Guantanamo bay.

CAIMANERA, June 15.—One hundred Spaniards were killed and 200 wounded in the fight with the American marines and Cubans yesterday. No Americans were killed.

MORE SOLDIERS NEEDED.

Oregon's Governor Issues a Call for More Volunteers for the First Regiment. Before Oregon can send a second volunteer regiment to the front she must furnish men to fill the ranks of the one she has already sent out. The order for this came yesterday, and Adjutant-General Tuttle will lose no time in getting the men together.

The following proclamation was issued by Governor Lord Tuesday: Whereas, Under the second proclamation of the president of the United States for troops, the secretary of war estimates that there will be needed of the quota of Oregon about three hundred and thirty (330) enlisted men, to fill the second Oregon volunteer regiment, already raised, to its maximum; and, Whereas, It is requested by the secretary that such men shall be enlisted proportionately from the different localities in which the companies of said regiment were raised, in order to distribute them as nearly as possible in the companies raised in such localities:

Now, therefore, I, William P. Lord, governor of the state of Oregon, in compliance with such order and request, do proclaim and make known to all persons desiring to enlist in the Oregon volunteer regiment that the proportionate number of men for enlistment, to which the different localities of the state will be entitled, is as follows:

McMinnville..... 14 Eugene..... 25
Astoria..... 14 Pendleton..... 13
Ashland..... 14 La Grande..... 13
Oregon City..... 12 Albany..... 13
Salem..... 25 The Dalles..... 13
Hubbard..... 12 Woodburn..... 13

And, further, that orders from the adjutant-general's office in regard to the carrying into effect of the object of this proclamation.

TO CONTROL JACK.

Rules enforced on shipboard to keep the sailors in Abeyance.

The rules regulating the conduct of sailors may appear somewhat drastic, but it is needless to say that they are necessary in order to insure good government on a shipboard. A few of the more important ones are as follows:

For quarreling, or provoking to quarrel, he forfeits a day's pay.

The same punishment is inflicted on the man who carries a sheath knife.

If he brings spirits on board, he loses three days' wages.

For every smoke indulged in "below," he forfeits one day's wage.

The same if he neglects to put out lights when ordered.

If the lock-out man falls asleep, his nap costs him two days' pay.

If the cook has not dinner on the table at the stroke of the clock, it is a matter of one day's pay.

And for not being shaved, washed and cleaned up, and span on the Sabbath he loses a day's pay; also insubordination to master or mate means one day's pay lost, and striking anyone on board double that amount.

While for attempting to smuggle a few pounds of tea or tobacco or a gallon of rum he loses the wages of a whole month.

Cycles and Railroads.

A London correspondent of the Paris Messenger, in speaking of the annual and general excursions from that city during the Whitsuntide holidays, says that the excursions from the metropolis were almost wholly made on wheels. On Whit Monday it was impossible to hire or even buy a bike in London. The railways begin to feel the effect of this form of transportation, which exceeds the most extreme anticipations. At the same time the rush for bicycles was a sort of relief for railway omnibus and other vehicle passengers, which the rapid transit companies, however, did less enjoy than their fugitive customers.
