OUR BOYS IN HONOLULU.

An Interesting Letter From H. L. McAlister of Lexington. The following letter was kindly tendered the Gazette for publication by Mr. and Mrs. W. B. McAlister, received under date of June 21, from their son, who was conspicuous as the champion football player of the Corvallis college team...

Dear Father and Mother: To begin with I will state that I am enjoying the best of health. Leaving San Francisco hurriedly, I had scarcely time to write you. I am now with my company and have more time for letter-writing.

It is an ideal place on earth it is here. The luxuriant growth of tropical fruits and plants impress us with the idea of a vast greenhouse.

Long before we arrived in sight of the city, strange as it might seem, "Old Glory" could be seen waving high on the mountain side. The majority of us failed to recognize the Hawaiian flag on sight, but now are all familiar with it, as it floats from our main mast.

Being compelled to remain on board, we spent a sleepless night, owing to the heat. Today we were given "shore leave" from 9 till 2 o'clock. I had the good fortune to be one of the first to set foot on foreign soil, the American flag to be seen on every hand.

Tomorrow we look forward to as the "banquet day". We have been granted shore leave for the day, and assured of an abundance to eat. Over-eating, however, we are cautioned against in this climate.

I was compelled to remain aboard all day, missing the entertainment given the boys. The city placed at the disposal of the boys 2,000 pounds of potato salad, 16,000 bottles of soda pop, 20,000 pineapples, 8,000 sandwiches and tons of other fruit.

The mail steamer is expected in tonight, when we will know whether we proceed on our journey or remain here waiting further orders. We are all anxious to reach our journey's end. Many of the boys are homesick.

McCOY CONVICTED. Sent Fraudulent Matter Through the Mails—An Old Cheat. George W. McCoy, charged with using the United States mails for the purpose of promoting a fraudulent enterprise, was tried in the United States court yesterday, before Judge Bellinger and a jury.

The closing argument of United States Attorney Hall was a powerful arraignment of the methods employed by McCoy in promoting his scheme. The case went to the jury about 4:30 p. m., and after being out a short time they returned a verdict of not guilty—Oregonian.

About a year ago McCoy was in jail at The Dalles charged with defrauding employees on a little scheme which McCoy was fathering. He escaped hanging by a scratch, and had a close call from being convicted subsequently.

A shower of ice. A curious story is related in the Philadelphia Transactions: Her majesty's ship Simon was two days out from Cape Good Hope, when a hail came upon which precipitated a violent shower of ice. In his report Capt. Blakiston says: "It was not a hailstone at all, but a shower of irregularly shaped pieces of solid ice of different dimensions, some of them as large as a paving brick."
