CIRCUMVENTED THEIR CHIEF.

Defense of Two Washington "Cops" Who Had Slept on Their Beats. One of Roosevelt's many funny experiences with New York policemen recalls a story often told of Inspector Pearson, whose poiseless galoshes were long the terror of Washington "cops." While walking in one of the streets of Georgetown about 12 years ago, says the Washington Post, Inspector Pearson the doorstep of a private residence, oblivious to the goings on in their beats. Pearson quietly took the number of the house, and had the deliquents hauled before the trial board for neglect of duty. Ordinarily there would have been little hope for men in their position, but they were resourceful. STILL ON THE BOOKS.

Government Treasurer Carries an Item Representing Paper Long Ago Destroyed. The books of the United States treasury still carry an item of \$1,000,00 which represents United States note which are supposed to have been connumed in the great Chicago fire 25 years ago, says the New York Sun. It was known that there was \$1,000,000 of currency, more or less, in the vaults of the subtreasury then, and that none of it was recovered, but the denomnations of those notes and the exact amount are unknown, as the books of the cashier were consumed also. There could not have been, however, very many dollars less or very many dollars more than \$1,000,000, and it would sim-Undisputed Supremacy plify the accounts of the treasury and ave a great deal of labor to the bookkeepers if congress should pass a bill or resolution recognizing the fact that this money is no longer in existence, for every day when the cashier of the treasury balances his accounts he has to include this item, deducting it or adding it as the case may be from the amount n hand. It appears upon every daily weekiy, monthly and yearly statement of the assets and liabilities of the government as "unknown destroyed United States notes, \$1,009,000."

EXERCISE A NECESSITY. Early Decline of Physical Powers Due to

Neglect of Athletics. Beyond the age of 40-at a period when so many are physically lazy-the superior value of exercise is apparent, but ordinarily this is just the time when the hygient of athletics is neglected, aptly observes Rev. F. S. Root. There is no reason why a punching bag, rowing machine, pulley weights and other apparatus should be relegated to college boys and clerks. But, having your fine pork and lamb done a good deal of work in his time, it is almost impossible to persuade a business or professional man turning 40 to give any sort of attention to physical culture if such training has been previously neglected. It is an inexorable physiological law that we can only retain our bodily or mental powers by properly using them. Exercise is not a matter of choice, but of necessity.


