LA GRANDE LAND OFFICE. Nearly 5,000,000 Acres Unappropriated in

the District. E. P. Show, of the United States land office at La Grande, has completed a tabulated statement of the status of lands in the La Grande land district for the year ending June 30. The table shows that the area of unappropriated and unreserved land in Union county is as follows: Surveyed, 854,106 acres: unsurveyed, 481,831; total, 1,835,939 acres: appropriated, 692,061; total A day stop-over arranged at acreage of land surface in Union county, 2,028,-000, of which 75 per cent is timbered and mountainous, 20 per cent grazing, and 5 per cent farming. There are no arid lands in Union acres unappropriated and unreserved lands, of Famous Colorado Scenery. which 4,419,913 acres are surveyed and 1,384. 831 acres are unsurveyed. The lands reserved onsists of 151,300 acres, and the appropriated lands amount to 2,886,896 acres. The total area of land surface in the district amounts to 8,843,-000 acres. All the reserved lands are in Umatilla county.-La Grande Chronicle.


