Mammoth Buck Deal.

The Fossil Journal says: One of the biggest buck sales ever made on the Pacific coast took place at Hay creek last week, when a sheepman from Montana purchased practically all the bucks that the Baldwin Sheep and Land company had left for sale this year—about 700 head. The bucks will be shipped to Montana from The Dalles. The price is private, but it could not be much, if any, under \$7,000—a tidy sum to come from another state to one firm for bucks.
