MRS. E. G. SLOAN DROWNED.
Relatives Believe She Was Drowned in the Willamette.

Wednesday John McCarty, who reached here on the morning train, was called to the telephone and requested to return on the night's train to Portland, as his mother-in-law, Mrs. E. G. Sloan, was supposed to have fallen into the Willamette river, at the Madison street bridge, and drowned. In conversation with Mr. McCarty he could give no particulars.

Thursday morning Mr. F. I. McCullum, of John Day, arrived, and relates that he happened on the Morrison street bridge, during the day, when, on looking into the water, he saw the body of a woman drifting slowly toward the west end of the bridge. At the same time the bridge tender discovered and rushed for a boat below, succeeding in overtaking it, and, while attempting to secure it with a rope, it suddenly disappeared beneath the water, after which no trace of it could be found.

As a rope obscured the features Mr. McCullum was unable to identify it, but noticed particularly that it was the body of a large woman, whose wearing apparel answers the description of Mrs. Sloan.

Thursday evening's Telegram confirms the theory that it was Mrs. Sloan's remains, and accounts for its floating so soon after drowning, which, under ordinary circumstances, does not occur inside of three days, that the clothes buoyed her up until the air escaped from her dress by being disturbed when it sank immediately.

Dr. Vaughan with members of the family spent Thursday at the scene of the disappearance hoping for the recovery of the body, by which it could be identified.

The starting news has been the source of constant inquiry in Heppner, over which it has cast a gloom of sorrow, owing to Mrs. Sloan's long association with our town and residents, where she was held in the highest esteem. The Sloan brothers, of Butter creek, are two sons, and two daughters, Mrs. John McCarty, of Portland, and Mrs. Robert Shaw, of Lexington, having been raised here, have the sympathy of all.

It is the supposition of her family and others that, as she at times has been subject to certain spells which more or less affected her mind, she became temporarily confused and unfortunately wandered in the direction of the river and fell in.

Rev. St. Clair's Reception.
The reception tendered Rev. F. F. St. Clair Wednesday evening proved a most enjoyable affair. The local preachers, with Judge Bartholomew, gave him greetings with warm words of welcome. The parish adjacent to the M. E. church, South, his future home, has been nicely furnished by Wells Brothers, and the comfort of Rev. St. Clair assured. He expresses himself as very much pleased with the locality and hospitality of the people.

The John Day Bridge.
Mr. McCullum, of John Day, informs us that upon his return home he expects to find the big dredge at work on the bed of the river. The intention of the company is to begin about two miles below the town, working up to it, and then down the river. For a great many years placer mining has been carried on extensively and with much success on the banks of the John Day in this vicinity, consequently it is expected that the experiment of this river dredges will prove an awakening in Eastern Oregon mining, as the bed of the river must be well stored with the precious metal.

Postmaster Vaughan returned this morning from Portland, and reports having an interesting time in the metropolis, having met numerous Heppnerites there who were strictly "in the swim." Yesterday he with others from here spent the day on the Morrison street bridge while the river was being searched in vain for the remains of Mrs. Sloan.
