DECEASED.

Holland B. Thompson, who came to town from Butter creek seven weeks ago, and has been at the home of his nephew, P. C. Creswell, undergoing medical treatment, passed away at 1 o'clock, Wednesday, from heart trouble and other complications. His physicians have realized for some time that, owing to his age and the seriousness of his condition, no hope for ultimate recovery could be held out. Mr. Thompson was 69 years of age, and in 1862 crossed the plains, settling at first in the Willamette valley, near Estacada, where he remained until 1876. He then came to this vicinity where he engaged in the stock interest, until a few years ago when he disposed of the same, retiring with a sufficient means to enable him to live independent of business. He was a bachelor and a brother of Press and Alex Thompson. He assumed the responsibility of the care of P. C. Creswell, his nephew, when a small child, whom he maintained until he had reached the age of 16 years. Then the young man assumed his own responsibility, and now in return for the interest and devotion of his early benefactor, Mr. Creswell afforded him the care and comfort of his home and family at the close of his earthly career.

### INDIAN WAR.

Indiana Arrests Boys of Stealing Ponies and a Fight Messes.

A telephone message to the Gazette from Canyon City reduces the Indian warfare in Grant county to the killing of a young man, and later to the shooting of an Indian in retaliation, the particulars of which are as follows:

A number of Columbia River Indians, enroute to the mountains, missed some ponies and went to a ranch, suspecting some boys, and women being there alone they caused them considerable fright. When the men returned they were informed of the trouble, and started out to reprimand the Indians, which resulted in a fight, during which Fred Catting, a young man employed by Scharff Brothers, of Monument, who went over to this section in search of horses, as Earl Scharff informs us, was shot and killed, his companions reverging his death by killing an Indian. When the report reached Canyon City a posse, under charge of the sheriff started in pursuit to arrest the Indians. Reports from them up to this time have not been received, consequently the reports current that six Indians were killed was idle rumor.

### Sheep-Corral Fracas.

Bernard Blackman was given a preliminary hearing before Recorder Richardson on two charges today. The first, assault with a deadly weapon, the evidence could hardly sustain, and he was discharged. On the second, threat to kill, he was bound over to keep the peace. In return for the charges brought against him by Jake Cowley, he retaliated by having Jake arrested and tried for assault, which the court failed to sustain. The origin of the trouble was simply boy's play, and the damage amounted to but a slight "peeing of the park" on the end of noses. The young fellows were about the same size, and should have found a soft spot in the barnyard, stripped down to fighting without appearing in court, which will take all their spare change for months to pay.

Watch for his announcement in the Gazette.</p>	<p><b>RESTAURANT ROW.</b> The Chinese Cook Fearfully Cut With a Glass Dish. Early risers Wednesday morning were startled with the report that a Chinese cook had been almost killed by a white waiter in China George's restaurant on Main street, while engaged in a row, and it proved that the young man, named Milton Chevalier, who had been there but a few days, had thrown a large glass dish at the Chinaman, almost severing an ear and gashing him frightfully across the face. Yesterday morning at the trial of Chevalier for assault with a dangerous weapon, charged by the injured Chinaman, it developed that they were wrangling over their respective authority, in the presence of one customer, and at the conclusion of abusive language between the two the Chinaman retired in the direction of the kitchen, and the white boy imagining that he was going for a knife, thereupon threw the heavy dish, catching the Chinaman fairly alongside the head, putting to flight all notions of fight on the part of Gong Lane, as he felt that his death blow had been received. The waiter and customer did not tarry to investigate the result of the blow, but beat a hasty retreat. Shortly China George and his injured cook were marching up Main street in search of a doctor and the marshal. Locating Dr. McFall, it required a vast amount of sewing to bring together the fragments of an ear and the gaping wound. Attorney Redfield appeared for the defense of the boy, while Attorney Phelps was engaged to prosecute the case. By the time of the trial, Wednesday at 2 p. m., owing to the fact that the Chinaman has made himself conspicuous on several occasions by drawing his butcher knife and putting to flight those who opposed him, popular prejudice was with the waiter and against the cook, and the court room was filled with sympathizers, who were not reserved in displaying their sympathy. At the close of the examination of witnesses and argument of counsel, which was spirited at times, the court reserved its decision until 10 o'clock yesterday morning, when it decided that the reputation of the Chinaman, had come to believe his life in peril and justified in making the best of his advantage.
