### THE INDIAN SCARE.

The Gazette's Report in Last Friday's Issue Confirmed.

Mr. R. F. Watkins, who reached here on last night's stage, affirms the report given in Friday's issue of the Gazette, and explodes the sensational accounts which have been published the world over. Instead of publishing idle rumor, we held a conversation by telephone with Mr. Simpson, the operator at Canyon City, who gave us the substance of our report, which was to the effect that but one Indian and one white man had been killed, which was over the dispute of a horse trade. The white boy retired to the barn, and as a method of intimidating the Indians, fired his revolver. When he came out the Indians shot him. Word was carried to Isee, where a posse was formed, and, overtaking the Indians, one was killed outright while one was shot through the foot, and it is now reported that the Indians elude another of their number is missing. The Canyon City posse, which went out to face an Indian war, returned home after interviewing the Indians and settlers and learning the nature of the trouble. A general stampede was inaugurated by the settlers, and families were hurried from all directions to the larger towns. The Indians were likewise scared out of their senses by the wild reports and hurried into near towns for safety. "Big Mouthed" Jim and "Blind Jim," with bands, are on the John Day near Canyon City, and were in no way connected with the affray.

### Returned From the East.

Oscar Minor returned from his trip East Sunday morning. Save four days, he was continuously railroading. Owing to mismanagement and a railroad collision, in which 50 sheep were killed, they were delayed one week in reaching St. Paul. The trip is usually made in nine days, but they required 17. On his return he spent three days at the Omaha exposition, which fully met his expectations. He returns well satisfied with Morrow county and stock interests are second to no other section of the country through which he passed. The grandeur of the scenery along the route is beyond industry interesting.
