PERFUMED STONE.

Very Strange Discovery Made Near Oregon City.

A young man from Portland, while exploring the country along Abernethy creek, near Oregon City, discovered in a outcropping where a road runs a stratum of perfumed sandstone about four inches in thickness, extending for some distance about four or five feet beneath the surface of the ground. The deposit is a sort of sandstone in process of hardening (it is composed of very fine sand or perhaps volcanic ash of a grayish color, and has a very perceptible perfume, which is still more plainly perceptible on one's hands after huddling it).

A number of persons who have examined the sample remarked that the odor it emits seemed familiar, but they could not tell what it resembled. One druggist said it smelled like vanilla bean, another thought it smelled like tonka bean. One said it smelled like the perfumed chalk used for writing on blackboards, and another that it smelled like earth. A woman of sensitive olfactory sense at once pronounced the perfume to be that of the "sweet leaves," or "vanilla leaves." Oregon may apply, which boys peddle around the streets in the spring and summer. A number of others have expressed the same opinion, and some have complained of the odor as sickly sweetish and overpowering.

The whole stratum and the earth on each side of it has the same perfume. Just how the stone became so thoroughly permeated with this odor seems impossible to determine. There has probably always been "sweet leaves" growing in that vicinity, but as there is four or five feet of soil on top of the stratum of stone it was probably deposited there centuries ago, and has been wafting its sweetness on the desert air ever since. If it were harder the stone might be cut into "satchets" or incense burners, perfume tablets. If it were used to build the walls of a church the perfume would be stronger and last longer than that of the musk in the Mosque of St. Sophia in Constantinople. Perfumed stone is a rarity and specimens of this will be sent to some scientists to be analyzed.

Free Shipments From Boise.

The gross returns of thirty-six cars of prunes shipped from Boise, Idaho, this season amounted to \$11,000. The Statesman adds the following figures: "It costs \$27 to ship a car of 24,000 pounds to Boston and \$70 additional for refrigeration. The charges of the fruit company and auction houses amount to 7 per cent. On the car bringing \$1,453 this commission amounted to \$101.70, making the total for freight, ice and selling \$543.71, the net return being \$909.29. It costs for boxes and packing \$125 per car or 900 crates. This leaves \$784.29 as the net value of the car fruit under consideration. There are 21,000 pounds of prunes in such car, the value of the fruit thus being shown to be 3.73 cents per pound, exclusive of all expense of packing, shipping and selling. This makes the value of the product of an acre of well loaded prunes trees nearly \$1,000.

LA GRANDE SUGAR-BEET FACTORY.

The Magnitude of the New Eastern Oregon Industry.

Rural Spirit. During the week of the district fair held in the Grand Ronde valley one day, Friday, was set apart as sugar beet or jubilee day. Thousands availed themselves of the opportunity to visit the factory and get an idea of its works, and through the courtesy of the management they were able to see the process of making sugar from the time the beets left the farm in wagons and were received into the factory at one end of the building until they came out sugar at the other end. Nothing but expressions of satisfaction were heard, both from the men that invested their money in the enterprise and from the growers of the beets.

Owing to the conditions that always attend a new enterprise of this kind, where everything has to be learned, and from the fact that of unusual hot season, the tonnage was below what was expected, but the richness of the beets was much greater than those grown in other parts of the country. Below we give a few items that will show what a factory of this kind means to any community.

The factory and its accessory buildings occupy 80 acres of land, and represents an actual cost of \$500,000. It grinds 350 tons of beets and turns out 35 tons of beets and turos out 35 tons of refined granulated sugar every 24 hours.

In the operation of the plant, it requires the labor of 100 skilled men, in addition to which there are employed in the fields in cultivating and harvesting the beet crop from 1,000 to 2,000 people. Each running season the factory consumes 8,000 cords of wood and 2,000 tons of lime.

The machinery is all of the very latest and most improved pattern, and taken together with the steel used in constructing the buildings, weighing upwards of \$2,500,000 pounds, every pound of which was made in the United States, the product of American labor.

In all about the buildings are pipes of different size which, if laid in line, would extend a distance of over 25 miles. To handle the crop of beets for 100 days run would take 23,333 wagon loads of one and one-half tons to the load, which, if placed in line, would make a continuous string of sugar beets over 100 miles long.

The amount paid annually into the hands of the people of the Grand Ronde valley for beets supplies and labor, with the present capacity, is over \$230,000. The buildings are built with a view of doubling the capacity of the factory next season, which will double the amount paid annually for beets, supplies and labor.

In the washing and refining process 1,000,000 gallons of water are used each 24 hours.

The beet pulp, which is dumped into the silos after the juice is extracted will fatten, each season, 1,500 grown cattle or 15,000 to 20,000 head of sheep.
