ROUND OVER.

T. C. Aubrey and Dave Dean arrested for stealing wheat.

On November 29th Theodore Anderson, living at Eight Mile, discovered that 58 sacks of grain had been taken from a stack located in his field. That day he spent in investigation, and concluded that the thieves would return for more and planned to watch the stacks, but, upon persuasion of his wife, gave up this intention. Sure enough, on the morning of December 29th, one month later, the tracks of two wagons—one a wide tire and the other a narrow one—had visited the place, carrying away 72 sacks. Proceeding on a hunt for the grain, he came to the premises of T. C. Aubrey and there found two wagons answering the description of the wagon tracks in his field loaded with about the number of sacks missing, as near as he could estimate.

At the lone warehouse he found that 58 sacks had been delivered on the day corresponding with the loss of the 58 sacks by Mr. Aubrey, and on this circumstantial evidence, caused his arrest and also Mr. Dean, who was his driver. Their preliminary hearing was held before Recorder Richardson yesterday, J. W. Morrow appearing for the prosecution and C. E. Redfield for the defense. A number of witnesses were examined and at the conclusion of the evidence Recorder Richardson required a short time for conclusion, and at 4 o'clock exonerated the young men, Dave Dean, in consideration of his being in the employ of T. C. Aubrey, and held Aubrey to await the action of the grand jury, under bonds of \$500. Mr. Aubrey and his attorney feel that their case is a safe one, and that the prosecution cannot establish the guilt of the accused.

An Elk Slayed.
Walter Van Dayn writes Dr. Swinburne an interesting account of an elk hunt last fall, a portion of which is as follows: "Last fall I had remarkable success killing three fine specimens. Unfortunately one of them broke his horns in falling when I shot him, and I am now working the horns up into knife handles. I made quite a speculation on the meat and tusk realizing \$110, and have a standing offer of \$50 for one set of horns and \$25 for the other. The first elk I killed dressed 670 pounds. I herewith send you as a New Year's gift one set of tusks, and will have the other pair mounted for myself."
