COUNCIL MEETING. The city council met in regular session Monday evening, all members being in attendance, save Councilman Simons, who was absent on account of sickness. First in order came the installation of E. W. Rhea, to fill the vacancy of E. G. Sperry, resigned. The petition of J. B. Natter for liquor license for ensuing quarter was granted. Remonstrance of J. W. Morrow et al. regarding removal of arc light in front of Palace hotel was tabled indefinitely. Committees on streets and public property were instructed to examine street from location of Representative Freeland's residence south to Jas. Adkins' with a view to the location of a sidewalk. A motion was passed requesting the Heppner Gazette to publish the financial reports of treasurer and recorder for the last quarter, ending December 1, 1898. City Attorney C. E. Redfield, Recorder Richardson and Mayor Morgan were instructed to draft a new charter for the city and report at the adjourned meeting on Saturday, the 21st. Wool Growers Meeting. Tuesday evening the Wool Grower's Association held its annual election of officers at the county court house, resulting in the re-election of O. E. Farnsworth, president, and A. B. Thompson, of Batter creek, secretary and treasurer. Mr. Thompson informs us that the important considerations of the meeting were the instructions to Senator Morrow and Representative Freeland to lead their energetic support to the scalp bounty bill, so important to the sheep owners of this and adjacent counties; also recommend them to have repealed the present scab law of Oregon, which is under regulation of appointed inspectors and have substituted, if possible, the Montana law, placing its enforcement under the jurisdiction of a state veterinary. In view of the important interests of the sheepmen in Eastern Oregon, much legislation is needed, and throughout the entire country active interest is manifest. The department of the interior is now making inquiry relative to the proposed leasing of grazing lands next summer. The sheep men of The Dalles are very much interested in this subject and will in the near future hold a special meeting, when Captain Ormsby, superintendent of the Cascade Forest Reserve, will be present to discuss this matter.
