CROPS AND WEATHER.

Report of United States department of agriculture, climate and crop bulletin of the weather bureau, Oregon section, for the week ending Monday, April 3, 1899:

This being the initial issue of the Weekly Climate and Crop Bulletin of Oregon for the year 1899, which is compiled from reports of over 200 corresponents in different sections of the state, it gives in addition, a summary of the past six months.

October.-The weather was cool and dry, conditions favorable for fruit drying and general farm work. Plowing and seeding progressed satisfactorily. Grass made a good growth, except over the stock country.

November.-Plowing and seeding were actively engaged in during the month. Grain sown in the dust in September and October east of the Cascades was well packed down by the November rains, and by the end of the month had made good growth. The rainfall was deficient east of the Cascades and range food for the stock was scarce.

December.-The month was cool and dry. Plowing and seeding continued in many sections of the state. The month was favorable to fall-sown grain and to agricultural work, but not favorable to section than to Oregon. It is due to the growth of range food.




