OREGON STOCK.

Lively Demand for Products of the Hange in the East

"Oregon is the great breeding ground for cattle and sheep. It is upon this Wyoming, the Dakotas and Nebraska must mainly depend for stock to replenish ranges depleted by the demand for 'feeders,' said J. L. Harris, general agent of the Union Stock Yards Company, of Chicago, while in Portland the other day.

"Our stock yards will use half a million sheep this year," he continued, of Oregon, besides a large number of cattle that have been grazed in the Rocky mountain states and fattened further east since leaving this state as yearlings or 2 year-olds. The demand for Oregon fed stock is to be permanent, so far as I can see now, and Oregon cat tlemen should take more pains to improve their stock than they bave been doing. Texas alone has spent \$2,000,-000 for improving stock during the past two years, and she is now beginning to resp the barvest from her investment. The stock Texas men have been importing from the east is Hereford and

Durbam, mainly the former." The demand for Oregon stock this season Mr. Harris finds to be good. He thinks young cattle low in flesh will be sent from this state to be fattened at the corn bings of the Mississippi valley, and the fat carcasses, increased 100 to 200 per cent in weight, will be shipped to Portland and Sound meat markets, to the profit and satisfaction of breeder, drover and consumer. He thinks, bowever, that Oregon stockmen are holding their sheep and cattle a little too high for the present market, although a large number of buyers are now in the field anxions to start their purchases eastward. The ruling prices now are: For 2-year-old steers, \$25 to \$27; yearlings, \$18. He thinks such prices as these ought to satisfy cattleralsers, as on a large scale there would be "millions in it."-Oregonian.
