WOOL GROWERS

Should Sell for Cash and Not Consign Their Oregonian. Product.

From past experience it has been demonstrated that the wool grower does much better when he sells his wool at home than he does by shipping it on consignment to the big wool concerns of the East, there to be handled and rebandled by the commission man, and with each and every handling there is a bill of expense attached. By the accumulation of vast quantities of wool in one place, buyers and manufacturers take advantage of the situation and bear the price, on the ground that there is more wool in sight than they know what to do with, and more coming.

The wool growers by using common sense judgment, and business foresight can, to a large degree, control the market. If wool is low, it would be ad visable to sell just enough to pay current expenses, and get the cash for it. In this way every man knows just where he stands. He either has his product or money.

By sending his wool to others to handle, the grower neither has his product or money, and is finally compelled to take what he can get, less freight. warehouse charges, insurance, commission, etc., which generally leaves him a very low figure.

And again; the gool grower has the advantage of knowing the condition of the market if he has the clip in his own bands, which he does not when it is in the hands of others.

The time is now at band when this year's clip will be ready for market. Again we would say, don't be induced by some oily-tongued sgent to ship to some promised market of which you know nothing. Sali for cash, and for all you can get, and always look for the top ! flgure.-Rural Spirit.
