William Conlee died in his bunk at the Irvington track last Sunday of heart disease. He was a horse trainer, and familiar to the Northwest.

The body of the woman found at Sprague Johnson has been identified as that of Violet Johnson, of Arizone, a diseased person, and it is supposed that she was murdered.

Reports received by the secretary of state show that since the new bounty law went into effect, in February, 1,737 coyote scalp have been paid for by the counties. The bounty paid amounts to \$3,514.

Major-General Monahan, army paymaster, has been ordered to Portland to pay pertaining to the payment of masted-out volunteers returning from Manila. He is to pay off the Second Oregon upon its arrival.

Mrs. W. J. Pymale died at her residence in Jacksonville last week. She was a pioneer and a noble woman and well known throughout Oregon. She was the daughter of Colonel Wm. Martin, who still lives in Jacksonville. Mrs. Pymale was a good writer and did much to advertise Southern Oregon and her interests. She was a good mother, devoted wife and one who will be missed by a host of friends.

In accordance with the wishes of a large number of the patrons of St. Helen's Hall and prominent adherents of the Episcopal church all over the state, arrangements will be made to retain Miss Tobias at the head of the hall, as lessee of the school property for the ensuing year. This is a good move and will be appreciated by the many friends and patrons who have been so well pleased with the management of that school since Miss Tobias has taken charge.

A few days ago there lay upon a marble slab at the morgue, in Portland, the body of a poor tramp. While attempting to board a train in that city, he fell to his death. There the body remained, in the last, long sleep, while hundreds drawn by a morbid interest, viewed the remains. Out of all the passing throngs, there was not one who ever knew him. At last there came a woman. In her hands she bore a bouquet of flowers. Quietly and without ostentation, she placed the flowers as an offering, at the head of the dead man. It was a tender, graceful act.

Blue Mountain Eagle.

Frank De Ford, of Hartman, at the head of a crew of sheepherders, passed through Long Creek Saturday, enroute to the Stein mountain country.

Harry Halstead moved his sawmill from Gilliam county last week, and will soon have it in operation at the head of Beech creek on the Frake's place, now owned by J. T. Berry.

The Blue Mountain Telephone line being constructed toward Grant county from Pendleton has been completed to Ukiah. Lines are now being constructed to Lehman and Hildway springs.

Doc Houser came in yesterday from the south country with 400 head of stock, which are to be shipped from this place via the O. R. & N., and Union Pacific routes to Nebraska, for fattening for the markets of the East. Houser has gathered these cattle from various parts of the southern part of the county and Grant county, and they are pronounced a fine lot of stock.—East Oregonian.

J. M. Boardman, a wealthy cattle owner of Montana, again makes a large cattle drive from Grant county, this time taking about 2,000 head of choice young stock. Mr. Boardman has for years been a heavy purchaser of Grant county stock, last season having bought 3,000 head of our cattle, which he shipped to the Montana ranges.

CALL IT "DEATH CAMAS."

Department of Agriculture Report of the Poisonous Plant.

David Casey has received from the department of agriculture at Washington a report on the poisonous plant he sent recently. V. K. Chestnut thus writes:

Washington, D. C., June 15, 1899

Mr. David Casey, Pendleton, Ore. — Your letter of June 8, together with the accompanying specimens is at hand. Please accept my thanks for your prompt co-operation.

The plant is so-called "death camas," or "hog potato," *Zygadenus venenosus*. There are several species which are closely related, and all of these have it a reputation of being poisonous, the bulb being the part generally alluded to in reports. These bulbs sometimes get mixed up with the camas bulbs used so extensively for food by Indians throughout California, Utah and the Northwest, and if vomiting is not soon induced the mess may prove fatal.

There is no question in my mind that the bulbs are, in certain stages at least, also poisonous to some animals. I have no data to show that they are more dangerous at any one time than at another, but your own observations are substantiated in part by Dr. S. B. Nelson, of the Washington agricultural experiment station, who last year published a paper, entitled Feeding Wild Plants to Sheep, in bulletin 22 of the bureau of animal industry of this department. Dr. Nelson did not state what part of the plant was used in this particular experiment with the death camas, but plants fed from May 31 to June 2 caused no ill effect. As much as one pound was fed at one time, so the experiment if carried on with the bulbs is very instructive; if carried on with the herbs it does not mean quite so much. I should like to know particularly about this plant from you. Is it the bulbs or herbs which poison your stock? V. K. CHESTNUT.

DOWN TO DAWSON CITY.

W. M. Radlio Going Down the Yakon With His Cattle.

W. M. Radlio, a merchant of Long Creek, who departed from Seattle about June 1st with a band of cattle, arrived safely at the head of Lynn canal after a trip that occupied the usual time from Seattle. The trip to Alaskan soil was made safely, only losing on the trip one steer, which died from suffocation. In a letter to his family, of Long Creek, he stated that he would drive at once over Chilkoot pass, and at the head of Lake Bennett will load his cattle on boats and run down to Dawson City. He expects to make the trip from Seattle to Dawson City in less than a month.

The outlook for beef at Dawson City is excellent, and Mr. Radlio is fortunate to have the flat bands on the road down the river. He expects to be able to reach home by the first of September.
