epartment of Agriculture Report of the Poisonous Plant.

David Casey has received from the department of agriculture at Washington a report on the poisonous plant he sent recently. V. K. Chestnut thus writes:

Weshington, D. C., June 15, 1899 Mr David Casey, Pendleton, Ore :-Your letter of June 8, together with the accompanying specimens is at hand. Please accept my thanks for your prompt co-operation.

The plant is so-called "death camas," or "hog potato," Zygadenus venenosus. There are several species which are closely related, and all of these bave the reputation of being poisonous, the bulb being the part generally alluded to in reports. These bulbs sometimes get mixed up with the cames bulbs used so extensively for food by Indians throughout California, Utah and the Northwest, and if yomiting is not soon induced the


