State News  
Baker City is to have a free postal delivery on the 1st of October.  
Mrs. Anna Squires Burton is the stage driver and mail carrier between Tillamook and Hobsonville.  
Superintendent Ackerman has sent out copies of the course of public school studies as provided by the Daily Law.  
Judge A. S. Bennett, of The Dalles, has just moved with his family into a handsome new home, built after his own ideas.  
Miss Susie Stott and Miss Dekum are to be maids of honor to the regatta queen from Portland and Miss Tongue from Hillsboro.  
A fire at Astoria on the 28th injured the Herald and Budget each to the amount of \$500. The Budget was insured for the full amount.  
A Greek named Antone Picinlo was seriously stabbed by Antone Sullivan in a dance house in Astoria. The latter was murdered in under arrest.  
Andy King, of Montana, and Tom Scott, of Pendleton, feather-weights, fought with gloves at Pendleton recently. Scott was knocked out in the third round.

The record in the clerk's office of Grant county shows that during the month of June there were 70 mining locations and for the month of July, up to and including July 26th, 103 locations were made.  
It is stated that more money will be put in circulation by the banks this season than in any previous year, owing to the large acreage and the high price that will have to be paid to gather the crop.  
Mrs. Herman Helms has received the \$3000 on the beneficiary certificate of the late H. V. Helms, who was a charter member of Banner Lodge No. 23 of Jacksonville, organized in February, 1881.  
Col. Robert A. Miller has retired from the presidency of the Willamette valley Chautauqua at Oregon City, which closed a successful season last week, and has been succeeded by President W. C. Hawley, of Willamette University at Salem.  
Walla Walla has broken its record for the arrest of drunks. During the month of July 150 weary ones were run into the city jail for over indulgence in the ardent. The State warden says the profits to the city for those arrests was \$81.50 cash and \$174 in work, and the only expense was a few meals.  
Lieutenant Lewis, of The Dalles, says of thirty-five applicants he has accepted eight recruits and rejected twenty-seven. Five left this morning and three will leave tomorrow. Others are examined daily, and no doubt quite a number will be taken into the regular service before the lieutenant leaves the city.  
Governor Geer has decided to present the members of the Second Oregon regiment with a bronze medal, to be cast from one of the cannons captured in the Philippines. He has written to General Shafter with a view to securing the cannon. The governor is now studying out the design for the medals and figuring on the cost. While there is no appropriation for the purpose, the governor feels confident that the next legislature will provide the necessary funds.  
The home canning business must be on the boom at Lamton. Three thousand head have recently been bought up on the Blunco Indian reservation, and are being brought here and shipped to that preserve of horse flesh. They are fine looking animals, too. Last year among those that were bought for that purpose, a man saved out a team, for which he has since been offered \$150.—Dalles Chronicle.

The Dalles Times-Mountaineer says: Hon. J. B. Hawson, of Arlington, was in the city yesterday on business. Mr. Hawson has recently returned from a visit to the Big Bend country, and says everything is prosperous there. The farmers in that section will harvest an immense crop, and if they get good prices will have money to burn next fall. The town of Davenport, he says, is a progressive little city that is doing an immense business.  
The following telegram was received in Portland yesterday by General Bebe from General Sumner: "Will leave here Tuesday, 5 p. m., and arrive home Thursday, 2 p. m. Will bring through fully 600 men or more as a regiment. Arrange for a reasonable parade. At the end of the parade the colors will be presented to the governor, also the governor can review the parade. Have a band for the regiment, as ours had to turn their instruments back."—Dalles Chronicle.

The Ashland Fruit Association last week shipped over 2000 boxes of Alexander peaches to markets north of here. The markets were a little weak the last of the week, but fair prices were realized on shipments. Today Ashland peaches are quoted at 50c in Portland and 60c per box at Sound points. Next week will see the Big Bend in market which are more popular with buyers than the Early Alexanders. Black berries are in the market in quantity now. One hundred crates were shipped out by the fruit association today. The price is now 75c per three gallon crate.—Tidings.

Blue Mountain Eagle.  
Harvest is in full blast throughout the county and harvest hands, as usual, are much in demand.  
Knowlton & Myers Comedy company will appear Monday and Tuesday nights at the Wood-ale opera house.  
E. E. Allen departed for Pendleton Wednesday with a band of beef cattle for Plazoeder & Minger, of that place.  
Wm. Hughes, of Heppner, passed through Long Creek Tuesday, enroute to Ritter on business. He was accompanied by George French.  
Mr. Baker, who was brought to Long Creek some time since for treatment for an accidental gunshot wound, has almost recovered and is able to get about.  
Reports from Heppner say that the smallpox scare is abating, and the business of that place has assumed its normal condition again. The majority of the cases are in very mild form.  
John Ayers and Herbert Bartholomew, of Heppner, have been in this valley for the past week buying cattle. They were paying the usual prices and have purchased about 30 head. They will receive at the Cougar-creek next Friday.  
Robt. Fuller, of the firm of Fuller & Trask, and W. H. Cohoe, returned last Saturday from a trip to Dickinson, North Dakota, where they went some time ago with a band of sheep. The Eagle is informed that the trip was a successful one, losing no sheep on the trail or train. The sheep will be ready to ship to the market in a few days and the sheep will soon be in condition to put on the market. Mr. Fuller returned for the purpose of purchasing a train load of stock cattle, which he will ship to the Dakotas.

Spokane's Fair.  
The Spokane Industrial Exposition in October will not only have a splendid mineral exhibit, but one of the most interesting features of the big show will be the mining machinery department. This machinery will be in actual motion, and will be grinding out the ores, pounding rock, drilling, etc., day after day at the fair. All the latest mining machinery, appliances and mining devices will be on exhibition. The big mining machinery houses will put in extensive exhibits. Mining men will find this department very interesting and instructive. The motion of the machinery will also be interesting to every other man, woman and child who visits the exposition. Baker City has promised to send a large quantity of ores, which will be worked up in machinery hall during the fair.  
In the mineral department at the Spokane Industrial Exposition this year gold, silver and bronze medals will be awarded for entry for these minerals and mining camps will be more valuable than any cash prizes would have been. For the state or province making the best collection exhibit there will be a gold medal given; for the second best, a silver medal, and for the third best, a bronze medal. British Columbia, Idaho, Washington, Oregon and Montana will be competitors for this gold medal.  
For the best district exhibit there will be gold, silver and bronze medals for the first, second and third prizes. Rosland, Slocan, Republic, the Coeur d'Alene, Bonanza, Hump, Baker City, Washington, Oregon and Montana will be competitors for this gold medal.  
There are a number of individual exhibits for which prizes are offered. For each of these individual exhibits a silver medal will be given for the first prize and a bronze medal for the second prize. The difference at individual prizes will be as follows:  
For the best exhibit of gold nuggets; for the best exhibit of free gold ore; for the best exhibit of silver ore; for the best exhibit of silver-lead ore; for the best display of copper ore; best display of copper-gold ore; best display of coal; best display of ornamental stones and for the best technical exhibit. In each of these classes there will be silver and bronze medals awarded.  
In another department a bronze medal for the first prize, and a diploma for the second prize will be given for the best exhibit in each of the following classes: Iron, coke, clay, manure, agricultural products of day, building stone, slate, lime, limestone, asbestos, zinc ore, antimony ore, molybdenum, platinum, rare minerals and precious stones.  
In all the above competitions only minerals from Washington, Idaho, Oregon, Montana and British Columbia will be eligible for entry for the awards. But there are prizes which will be open to competition for exhibits from all parts of the world. These are as follows:  
For the best exhibit, a silver medal will be given; for the second best exhibit a bronze medal will be given. Silver and bronze medals will also be given for the first and second prizes for the best technical exhibit.  
The mineral department has gone at its work in ample season, and intends to have all exhibits in place by the opening day. In order to do this it has been decided that exhibits not on place on October 3d, the opening day of the exposition, cannot compete for awards.  
In order to decide these awards a jury of three will be chosen. Great care will be exercised to secure the best possible judges for these departments. The judges will make their awards as the medals can be shown at the exhibition by the winners.
