Government Land to Be no Longer Free to Stockmen. Lemmon E. Scribner, chief of the geology division of the agricultural department, has just returned to Washington from an extended tour of the Pacific coast and Northwest, where he went to study the grasses and forage plants of those regions, says an Associated Press dispatch.

Radical measures will be required to restore them to first class condition as pasture lands. Upon the advice of Professor Scribner, Secretary Wilson in his forthcoming annual report will recommend that the government cease the policy of allowing free grazing and substitute a system of leases.

This would place the land leased entirely under the control of the lessee and make it to his interest not to overstock his range. As a further incentive it is suggested that it might be well to give the lessee preference when land is sold.
