



IN SULU LAND.

In that new possession of the United States both slavery and polygamy exist. There you find renegade Arabs; native he drifts to Sulu. Like a western minin their hands are very deadly weapons one. at close quarters, especially the barong whose weight-in some cases five pounds -combined with its excellent balance, makes it especially effective. With firearms-as is usually the case among Orientals-the Sulus are not skilled Dato Jokanine himself-supposed to be the most redoubted warrior of Suluhad a quarrel with a hadji. They decided to settle the matter with rifles. The duel came off in an open field. After exchanging 35 shots, each man dodging about as he pleased, the hadji retreated, acknowledging himself beaten. But not a single bullet took effect.

If one freeman kills another, the murderer is brought before one of the datoes and fined one hundred and eight dollars, or fifty-four dollars gold. There is, however, no fine for killing a slave. Slavery among the Sulus does not orig. inate in difference of race or color; neither has it its origin in war. The slaves are of the same race as their masters, and are for the most part soquired in payment of past debts. Thus, if a man owes you a large sum of money, be may sell bimself or his children to you, and thus cancel the debt. Girls are sold for hard cash, but it is not a common occurence, nor one which takes

place against the will of the girl. Most of the Moros have several wives. although they are limited by the Koran to four. Besides these wives, they have innumerable concubines. If one of the plete. Divorce is common and simple. If a man no longer desires his wife, he divorces her, and she returns to her family. It is not considered a disgrace to be divorced. In spite of all these inequalities, the Sulu wemen are independent by nature and well treated.




