THE WAR IN CHINA.

Tien Tsin, July 15, Chinese from the walled city report that the foreigners in Peking are leaving, having taken shelter in a bomb-proof building.

London, July 24.—The Foreign Office has received a dispatch from the British Consul at Tien tsin, dated July 21, stating that he had just received a letter from the British Minister at Peking, and dated July 4, appealing for relief.

Washington, July 24.—Mr. Wu, the Chinese minister, said tonight that he hoped that the reply of Minister Conger at Peking to the second message sent to him by Mr. Hay would be received with more expedition than the first.

Anarchy in Peking. Che Poo, July 24.—General Li, commanding the Pei Tang forts, near Taku, reports to the British office that a runner who left Peking July 14 reports that Peking was in a state of absolute anarchy.

Russia Holds the Railroad. Tien Tsin, July 21.—The Russians announce their intention to keep control of the entire railway line between Taku and Peking, until the conclusion of hostilities.

WOOL. There seems to be no market in Heppner now, and buyers have all left. The production of the territory tributary to Heppner amounts to 3,000,000 pounds this season.

The Boston wool market continues quiet, although some houses are making inquiry for wool by manufacturers. Prices are generally nominal for fine medium and fine territory.
