Portland, March 27.
The price of wheat has gone up, so that 45c is being paid around Umatilla and Wada Wada and there has been a four selling movement.

Wool-Valley, 14c to 15c for coarse, 16c to 18c for best; Eastern Oregon, 9c to 12c; Indian, 20c to 25c per pound. Sheepskins-Shearings, 15c to 20c; short wool, 20c to 30c; medium wool, 30c to 50c; long wool, 60c to 80c each.

San Francisco, March 26-Wool - Novade, 11c to 15c per pound; Eastern Oregon, 10c to 13c; Valley, Oregon, 14c to 15c. Fair-mountain lambs, 9c to 10c; plains, 6c to 7c; Humboldt and Mendocino, 10c to 11c.

Chicago, Mar. 26-Cattle - Receipts 3,500; including 100 Texana; generally steady, Texana 10c higher. Good to prime steers \$3.00 to \$3.50; poor to medium, \$2.75 to \$3.00; stockers and feeders, \$3.00 to \$4.25; cows, \$2.70 to \$4.00; heifers, \$2.50 to \$4.00; canners, \$2.00 to \$2.50; bulls, \$2.75 to \$4.35; calves, \$4.00 to \$5.75; Texan fat steers, \$3.40 to \$4; Texas bulls, \$2.50 to 3.75.

Sheep-Receipts, 15,000; steady to strong; lambs strong. Good to choice wethers, \$4.80 to \$5; fair to ch. mixed, \$4.50 to \$5.85; Western sheep, \$4.80 to \$5.00; yearlings \$4.80 to \$5.10; native lambs, \$4.80 to \$5.50; Western lambs \$5.10 to \$5.50.

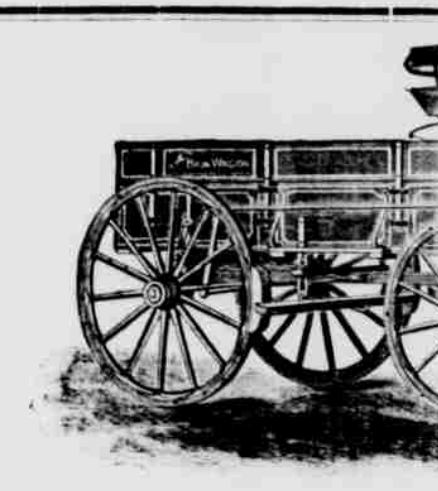
