Smead is dividing up his big Blacklock orchard among Minnesota colonists. At Monument Joe Putnam is having a band of wild horses broken by Burostov & Hoigaste. A. P. Laam, who used to live at Hamilton, was killed at Weiser last week by a falling tree. Wm. Matter, the old-time ferryman on the John Day, has bought Otto Kiser's Pine creek ranch. Asher Montague bought from the Northern Pacific 1600 acres of land located in the Eightmile country. There is practically no unshod wheat at the Dalles, fifty cents a bushel having "fetched" the last of it, says the Chronicle. Some 7000 sacks of wheat has recently been bought up along the Heppner branch by the Arlington Warehouse Co. at 43 to 45 cents. Of the three carloads of fat cattle recently shipped to Portland by J. N. J. Hale, of Ione, was in town yesterday. Peter Conroy has sold his ranch to Grant Wade. Harry Webb has bought Jerome Bridges' ranch. Canyon City polled 106 votes and elected E. Hicks mayor. The Arlington postoffice has been fitted out with new bronze boxes. Farmers around Olex are sowing a very large acreage of spring grain. At Cross Keys Bolter & Son have sold 39 head of cattle for \$1500. Sheepmen around Shaniko say that their grass is getting rather short. John Schassen was the last unfortunate man to lose his dwelling by fire. W. L. Vinson has sold the Carroll B. mine, east of Granite, for \$500,000. Mrs. T. W. Ayers started yesterday on a trip to Paso Robles Springs, Cal. Miss Ethel Walbridge has been having a serious time with lagrippe for several weeks. After a most enjoyable trip through California, Mr. and Mrs. Clendenin arrived Friday, and are visiting at A. C. Giger's, Mrs. Clendenin's brother. The hose company has commenced training in earnest and now that the weather is settled the boys will be out in force every evening in order that they may be in first class condition for the tournament. The city council has inaugurated a kind of Dr. Parkhurst movement in Heppner's Whitehead district and has compelled several tough characters to leave town. It is intended that the moral atmosphere of that locality will be somewhat purer. The opium joints are also being closed for the authorities will not allow opium smoking to be indulged in here, and the Chinese, who run the opium joints in connection with their laundries, are likely to be driven out of town any time if they do not comply with the city laws.
