BOSTON WOOL MARKET.
Boston, April 13.—The American Wool and Cotton Reporter says: The wool market is decidedly more quiet and a very marked falling off in the volume of business is more noticeable. The consumers have apparently supplied their needs for the time being, and although the smaller mills have been, they have taken on only small lots, the aggregate of which is figured at 3,608,000.

This quieter condition of affairs was not unexpected, and is not unnatural, after the enormous business previously transacted. It would have been strange indeed if such a pronounced activity had been longer maintained in view of that fact that the great bulk of purchasing is for consumption. Probably not a pound of the large total given last week was bought for speculation.

Although there has been such a marked falling off in the volume of trade there is no weakening whatever in the prices. The sales for the week in Boston amounted to 3,393,000 pounds domestic and 215,400 pounds foreign, making a total of 3,608,000, against a total of 11,485,000 for the previous week, and a total of 3,692,000 for the corresponding week of last year.

The sales since January 1 amount to 68,734,000 pounds, against 48,621,000 for the corresponding time last year.

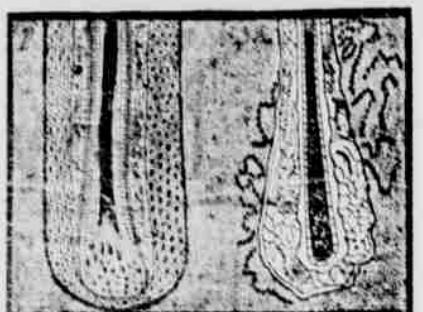

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FACTS AND FIGURES.
C. J. Millie, livestock agent for the O. R. & N. Co., has made a map showing those counties which lead in the raising of sheep, cattle, horses and hogs. According to Mr. Millie's map, Morrow and Umatilla counties are given first place for the production of sheep. Mr. Millie devotes much of his time for the collection of statistics relative to the livestock interests of the state. As a result of his investigations he gives the following figures for 1900 which will prove of interest to livestock men. Of horses he finds there were 300,000 in the state; cattle, 750,000; sheep, 2,500,000; hogs, 90,000. Sales of Oregon livestock in 1900, \$10,500,000; sales of Oregon wool in 1900, \$2,500,000. Total sum realized from the sale of livestock and its products, \$13,000,000.

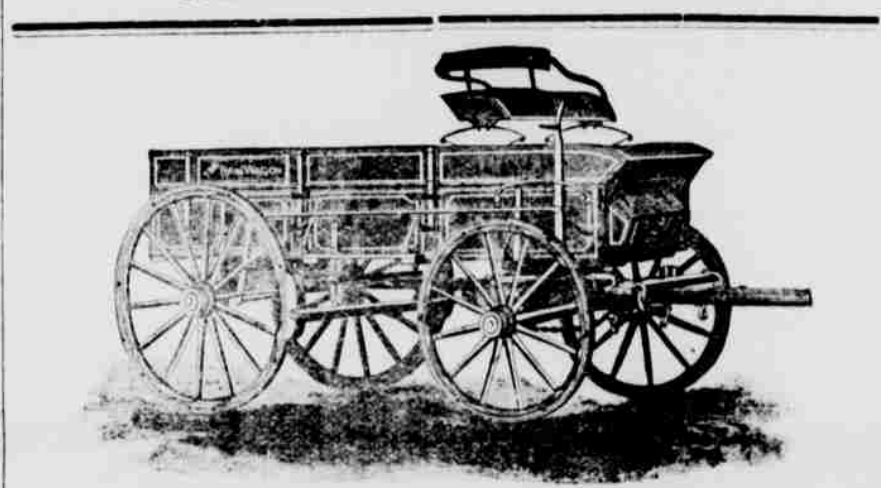
