Portland, June 17, 1901.
The cool spell which overspread Oregon June 1 continued almost uninterrupted until the afternoon of the 14th, when a welcomed change to warmer occurred, and the following Saturday, Sunday and Monday were bright, warm, sunny days, that proved very beneficial in ripening grain and advancing the growth of hops, corn, potatoes and gardens. The maximum temperatures during the week in western Oregon ranged between 50 and 54 degrees, and the minimum temperatures between 40 and 60 degrees. In eastern Oregon the maximum temperatures ranged between 50 and 80 degrees, and the minimum temperatures between 30 and 34 degrees. Light frosts occurred in some of the most elevated districts and the damage done by them was confined to small spots here and there and was not extensive. The fore part of the week was showery in the northern portion of the State, and, except in portions of southern Oregon there is now ample moisture in the soil to carry the grain crop through to maturity.

The condition of fall grain is not as promising as it was last week. In the Willamette valley it is becoming spotted, and complaints of fields turning yellow are more numerous than heretofore. The grain aphid has again made its appearance in the upper portion of the valley, but it has not as yet done much damage. In Umatilla, Baker and Union counties fall wheat in low places and hollows was killed by the frosts of June 4 and 5, and some has been cut for hay or else plowed under. The crop as a whole, however, continues promising, and with favorable weather from now on will yet prove an average one. Haying has begun, with yields above the average, both as to quantity and quality. Gardens are backward and frosts Wednesday morning in southern Oregon injured considerable garden truck in Josephine and Jackson counties and also huckleberry and some fields of alfalfa. The first cutting of alfalfa has also been injured by frost in Eastern Oregon, but the stalk is vigorous and there is no reason why the second cutting should not be up to the usual average.

Reports regarding fruit vary widely. In some sections the trees have all they can carry, while there are many orchards that will not produce sufficient fruit to pay for its being gathered. In the Powder River valley all fruit suffered severely, and throughout eastern Oregon there will be a general shortage over last year's yields of prunes and apples.

BOSTON WOOL MARKET.
Boston, June 18.—There is no change in the wool situation here, except that values between fine and medium grades are wider apart. The market at present appears to be a fine wool market, and from present indications will continue so for some time to come. The strictly fine grades are in best demand, but this is not extreme enough just now to force values up to any extent. The lack of speculative feeling among manufacturers is noted by dealers, who say the former are only buying to supply present demands. Territory wools continue to lead the sales. Fine medium and fine staple is selling at 40@42c on the scoured basis, while the strictly staple article is quoted at 44@45c.

Territory, scoured basis: Montana, fine medium and fine, 13@14c; scoured, 40@42c; staple, 44@45c. Utah, Wyoming and Idaho fine medium and fine, 12@13c; scoured, 40@42c; staple, 41@41c; Australian, scoured basis, spot prices coming super-fine, 71@72c; good, 68@70c; average, 65@67c.

Str. Louis, June 18.—Wool—Steady, unchanged; territory and Western, medium, 14@15; fine, 10@13c; coarse, 10@12c.
