There is an interesting case before the district court in Baker City, in which the stockman's Association is taking more than usual interest. It is the case of Mamie Howard, who is charged with horse stealing. Howard is somewhat noted, for the reason that he has been arrested for similar offenses several times before, but has always secured an acquittal when the case came to trial.
