CLOSE OF ACTIVE SEASON

Only Small Amount of Wool left in Heppner District.

GOOD PRICES REALIZED

Buyers Have Gone—Large Volume of Business Transacted in Short Time—Growers Satisfied.

The wool season is practically over, only a small amount of wool being left at the warehouses and in the hands of growers. The principal buyers who have been here during the season have gone and the business has simmered down to small proportions. Taking it all the way through the season has been the most active ever known here. Considering the large amount of wool on storage and in the hands of growers of both 1900 and 1901 clips, this great volume of business has been transacted in a remarkably short time. The average price was much better than was anticipated at the beginning of the season. As a general rule all have realized profitable prices. Of course fair prices was the cause of a general inclination to sell, however, there was not the usual desire to hold for speculative purposes. The big wool business from Heppner this season has been very satisfactory all around, and the feeling in business circles has been strengthened thereby. At the Morrow County Land & Trust Company's warehouse since January 1, there have been shipped 3,100,000 pounds of wool. At present there are only 150,000 pounds left at this warehouse. At the H. W. Heppner warehouse the figures will probably make about the same showing. Among the wool sales this week the following are reported: A. B. Chapman, 75,000 pounds at 10 1/2 cents per pound. A. Rood, 25,000 pounds at 9 1/2 cents per pound. Henry Heppner sold 125,000 pounds to Abbot & Kuhn at prices ranging from 11 cents to 12 cents per pound. D. W. Ralston was here Saturday picking up beef cattle. He shipped 4 carloads from Arlington Tuesday destined for the Seattle market. Mr. Ralston ships all his stock to Seattle lately finding a better market there than at Portland—Condon Globe. D. S. Brown turned off 100 head of 2 year-old steers the other day. E. P. Weir being the purchaser. D. W. Ralston took 40 head of the best beef out of the bunch for market and Mr. Weir will be the balance. The price paid Mr. Brown was \$30 per head. He purchased most of the stock a little more than a year ago for \$20 per head—Condon Globe. Hank Putnam, a cattle buyer well known to Grant county cattle growers, arrived in town early this week accompanied by his wife. Mr. Putnam is buying beef cattle for Frye, Bruhn & Co., of Seattle, and is here looking out prospective purchases. He reports cattle higher here in Grant county than prices in the east will warrant, having just received a telegram from his company not to buy any more beef until further orders, as beef would be cheaper in a short time. Mr. Putnam states that the drought in Kansas and all neighboring states, in that part of the Mississippi valley, has made it impossible to feed the number of cattle in that locality this fall as in former years, and would result in the price of beef cattle falling several dollars per head. However, at present, Grant county cattle growers are not uneasy over the market and are constantly turning off their beef and stock cattle for the highest prices—Reno Mountain Eagle.

Horses For Africa

Last night when left this city says the Walla Walla Union, over the Washington & Columbia River railroad a train load of horses destined for the use of the British Army in its campaign against the wily Boer in South Africa. One hundred and twenty horses that were born and nurtured on the plains and in the foothills of the northwest will go half way around the world to enter the first line of the Boer of the border.

None is Becoming a City.

It is estimated that about 6000 people have been landed here since the opening of the season, and every steamer arriving brings a full passenger list. About 1200 came down from Dawson, and their desirability as an accession depends altogether upon the point of view. The great majority of them belong to what is called the "sporting" class, and their departure from the Yukon country is due to the Dawson authorities' decision to close all gambling games. The crop of suckers, however, does not seem to be adequate to the demand, and this, with the territorial license of \$1.50 on saloons is making Nome a dull camp this year, notwithstanding the fact that the news from the gold fields is of the most encouraging kind. Among the newcomers are many notorious criminals, and there are sure thing men, thugs and minor criminals galore. The authorities, however, are fully adequate to the task before them, and it is to their credit that there is no more orderly city in the United States today, so far as safety of life and property is concerned. The rural free mail delivery system has been established here. There is trouble between rival claimants of mining properties in this district, and gunplay are quite frequent. The workingman who thinks of coming to this country would do well to figure a little. Wages here are \$5 per day and board, and it is out of reason to expect more than three months' work. It will cost \$75 second-class fare from Seattle, expense for extra clothing and blankets will not be less than \$75 more, and the return fare another \$75. This takes \$225 out of a possible but not probable \$450, and makes no allowance for illness, sickness or accidents of any kind. The chance of getting a valuable claim is not worth figuring on, as the country, except in the interior and extreme North, has been very thoroughly prospected and stakes are as plentiful as hop pots in the Willamette valley. What the country needs is capital. There is a surplus of laboring men here now and the outlook for the coming fall is certainly not pleasant. Mr. C. D. Lane is one of the class of men this country needs, and to his energy and ability will in a great measure be due the permanence of this city as a mining center. He clearly recognizes the difficulties existing and proceeds in a businesslike way to remove them. He has announced that during the coming Winter he will sell coal at not to exceed \$30 per ton, and horse feed at from \$30 to \$40 per ton. As Mr. Lane puts it: "The fact having been established that deep-diggings exist in this region, what is most needed to develop them is cheap fuel and cheap horse feed." As coal last Winter sold as high as \$150 per ton, it can easily be seen that Mr. Lane's announcement means a great deal to this community, and as he is a steamship owner and controls large capital, he can carry out his beneficial designs. At present he is putting in a large pumping plant to furnish water for the dry claims on Anvil Creek. It will have a capacity of 5,000,000 gallons daily and will be capable of lifting water to the top of Anvil mountain, thus enabling scores of otherwise worthless bench claims between Nome and Anvil to be worked at a profit—Correspondence, Oregonian.
