Two women recently made affidavits that Gray had confessed to them that he killed the girl. Gray claims to have had no connection with the case. He acknowledged he had had a conversation with the girl in the alleyway, but denied it was the murder.

INJUNCTION AT WELLVILLE

Wellville, Ohio, July 26.—It is reported that an injunction will be issued against the striking steel workers this afternoon. Two representatives of the steel trust are at Lisbon for the purpose of securing a restraining order.

SANTA ROSA, JULY 27.—Anderson Valley, Mendocino county, is in flames. Hundreds of acres of the farm and many farm buildings have been destroyed as a result of the explosion of a threshing machine on Friday in which William Rose and David Lear were killed. The cause of the fire is not known. The entire population is fighting the flames that were still raging this morning.

SETTLEMENT FOR 'FRISCO

San Francisco, July 27.—There is little change in the strike situation. More men are being employed than at any time during the week. Scott Hollis has conferred with the striking machinists at the Union Iron works since noon. It is understood that concessions will be made on both sides and probably the strike will be declared of next week.

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WHAT THE PRECEPT REQUIRES

The precept was made public this afternoon. It orders the court to inquire fully and investigate all of Schley's acts during the entire campaign, particularly the reasons controlling and the propriety of the movement of the squadron from Santiago to Santiago, the reasons for its departure from Santiago, the circumstances attending, and the reasons for his disobedience of the orders of the department on May 25, 1898. The necessity, if any, for returning to Key West for coal, whether an adequate of the blockade of Santiago harbor was maintained, and whether the maneuvers of the flagship during the battle were of a character to justify the Spanish fleet were proper.

WANT MACLAY REMOVED

The secretary promised to give the matter his early attention.

HONOLULU APPROPRIATIONS

Coast Line is Thought to Have Sunk Below Sea Level.

Honolulu, July 19.—Acting Governor Cooper has approved the appropriation bill passed by the legislature amounting to over \$5,000,000 and extended the date of the session for further consideration of appropriations to August 3. The salary bill alone for over \$2,000,000 amounts to an annual pension for ex-governor Lihoukalani of \$750. The extraordinary provisions of excessive high wages and salaries, and the paying a rise of the sea level six inches occurred during the past week.
