The health of the community will be better for the change. Blue Mountain Eagle: Fred Shank, of Mt. Vernon, arrived in town Saturday with freight from Heppner. Wallace Smead, of Heppner, accompanied by a number of residents of that place, arrived in the John Day valley last Friday, en route to the Blue Mountain hot springs. Harrison Hale, of Heppner, arrived in town Monday from Harney county, where he has been for some time buying cattle. He informs the Eagle that he found a great number of cattle for sale over there. He expects to return in a few days and commence receiving a large band. Mr. C. P. Johnson, of the firm of W. H. Johnson & Son, the largest sheep-owners in the John Day country, was in the city Saturday. Mr. Johnson reports that movements in the sheep market in the John Day country are very quiet this season. The volume of business is far behind the usual average at this time of year. One day last week Emmet Cochran purchased a band of about 1500 yearling ewes at \$2 per head. This is the only sale of any importance so far. There is an absence of buyers for Eastern shipment. The droughty conditions in the East, which has cut off some of the feed supply, has some effect on the foreign demand, and present conditions indicate that the fall purchases of feeders for shipment will be light. However, it is a little early yet to tell with a degree of certainty just what the business will amount to. The only business now is among local buyers, who are looking for sheep to stock up their bands. A few offers have been made, but they have not been satisfactory, and owners are inclined to hold for better prices. As soon as sheep commence to come in from the mountains, there will be more life in the market. Owners expect fair prices a little later on.

Noble returned last week from the East, where he has been for about a month. While there he visited a sister that he had not seen for forty years. Mr. Noble also visited the Pan-American Exposition. Corn over thirteen feet in height, at Minor & Co's store, has been attracting considerable attention. It was grown on Oscar Minor's farm, near this city. He has about an acre of this corn, and it is almost as good as that produced in the East. The stalks are loaded with long, heavy ears and show that Morrow county can produce good corn. LEXINGTON NEWS. Advance Agents of Colony Arrived—A Big Wheat Yield—Personal Notes. L. Boher is working early and late in the draying business. T. J. McMillan's 800 acres of wheat averages 18 bushels to the acre. Four steam and three horse power threshers are at work in the vicinity of Lexington. Rev. White, of the Christian church, with his family, arrived from Missouri early in the week. Only one Sunday school and one church service are kept up during the present hot weather. The men at the warehouse are very busy weighing and storing the wheat hauled in by the farmers. Robert Hogan, our new blacksmith, is assisted by a wagon maker from the East. The shop has all it can do. W. B. McAllister and wife returned from visiting friends in the East and the Pan American Exposition last week. The enterprising firm of Nichols & Leach is kept at work all the time in supplying the trade demands of Lexington. Lexington public school commences September 16th with three teachers, S. I. Stratton, Misses Ada Gentry and Elsie Palmer. Mrs. Potter is confined to her room with a serious illness. The doctor has been called to see her, and it is hoped she may soon recover. D. A. Porter has rented the former residence and office of Lawyer Sine from Mr. Burgoyne, its present owner. The building has undergone considerable alteration and repairs, and Mr. Porter has removed his candy store into it. Twenty persons, understood to be an advance, or the first fruits, of a colony from the East, arrived in Lexington during the week. They represent several trades and all seem energetic workers and alive to business. They brought with them twelve silver-plated horns, and are expected to enliven Lexington with music. Mr. Oscar Minor starts today for Spokane with 22 head of his fine shorthorn cattle, which he will exhibit at the Interstate Fair. This is one of the finest herds in America. With the herd is the great Sally Girl, champion cow of the United States in 1899. She was in all the principal fairs in 1899 in the West and never was beaten. He will also take Sassy Frantic, winner of first prize at Chicago, last December, when in competition with 40 of the finest calves in the United States and Canada. Mr. Minor will have five men in charge of the herd. From Spokane he will go to the State Fair at Salem. Jesse R. Stump, an Oregon pioneer of 1854 and a member of the Oregon Legislature in 1876 and 1880, died at his home near Silver, Polk County, at noon Thursday, of heart failure.
