A SORROWFUL NATION.

This is a trying time in this great country. It does not seem possible, but it is true, the great man, loved, respected and honored by every loyal American citizen, President Wm. McKinley, is dead.

When doing his duty in honest effort to obey the will of the people, his reward is the assassin's bullet. For the third time the people are grief-stricken for the murder of the president.

How uncertain is life. The president went to Buffalo, an honored guest. Who would have thought that murder was lurking in the heart of a single one of the proud assembly?

PRESIDENT ROOSEVELT.

By the death of Wm. McKinley, Vice-President Theodore Roosevelt becomes president. Mr. Roosevelt is the youngest man that ever occupied the presidential chair.

Governor Geer has issued a proclamation recommending that in respect to the memory of President McKinley who will be laid at rest at Canton, Ohio, on Thursday, September 19, that on this day "all public and private business be suspended, as far as possible, that flags be placed at half mast, that the people meet in their respective places of public worship to ask for that National consolation which can only come from Almighty God, and that at the hour of the funeral all church bells throughout the state be tolled as an expression of the grief which weighs upon our hearts as we pass through this shadow of National bereavement."

While the question of the organization of a commercial club is being advocated and agitated by a number of enterprising citizens, the need of an organization of this kind is apparent. The agitation seems to add force to the painful absence of such a body. There seems to be a determined effort by every one in the community to make the old folks' reunion in this city a success. The committees will leave nothing undone. To entertain the old folks and pioneers will be a special duty of every resident of Heppner.

Emms Goldman, who claims to believe that law is an enemy to the human race, when cornered, now cowers and begs for protection. Czolgosz, the cowardly assassin, when arrested, begged the officers not to let a mob lynch him.

Emms Goldman will probably go free, as nothing can be proven against her in a conspiracy to murder the President. Her actions and doings, along with the balance of the anarchists in this country, should be closely watched in the future, and there should not be much red tape in dealing with them.

The old folks' reunion, to be held in Heppner, October 11-12, will be the event of the Fall season. The city will belong to the old folks and pioneers of Morrow county, and they will be royally entertained. Most of the population of the county will be here and all will be welcome.

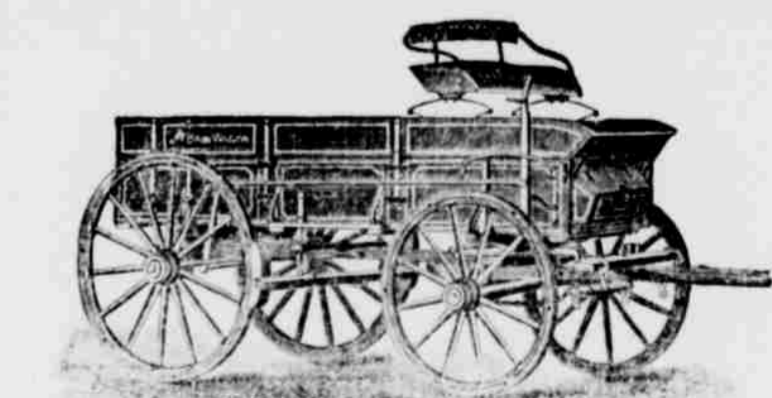
