WASHINGTON, Oct. 28.—Agriculture is the most important industry of Oregon, the development of manufacturing and mechanical industries since 1850 has been very marked," says a bulletin of the census office, made public today.

The natural resources of the state are extensive, furnishing material for its various manufacturing enterprises. It has three good harbors for the marketing of manufactured goods. The streams of the state furnish abundant power at The Dalles, the Cascade and Oregon City, and the mines are producing continually increasing supply of coal for fuel.

"In lumber and timber products is the principal industry in the state. In 1890 there were 4084 wage-earners employed in this industry, and the products were valued at \$10,352,167, as compared with 4214 wage-earners and products valued at \$9,530,557 in 1890. There were 776,978,000 feet (board measure) of lumber, exclusive of custom sawing, sawed in 1890, as compared with 470,146,000 in 1890. The importance of this industry is due to the remarkable forest lands of the state.

Flour milling stands second among the manufacturing industries of Oregon, and reflects the large wheat growing interest of the state, the production of this cereal amounting to 16,198,012 bushels in 1890. The flour milling industry gave employment to 443 wage-earners in 1890, and had a product valued at \$6,354,023, as compared with 281 wage-earners in 1890, and products valued at \$4,184,373.

The canning of fish ranks next among the industries of the state, with products valued at \$1,758,809 in 1890, as compared with \$1,645,324 in 1890. This industry which is almost entirely the canning of salmon caught in the water of the Columbia river and its tributaries has its center in the City of Astoria. The industry dates back to 1860, and reached its maximum production in 1883. It is carried on also on the north side of the Columbia river, in Washington, the value of the product of this latter state in 1890 being nearly a third of that of Oregon. The Columbia river has long been famous for its salmon, the product for the year 1890 exceeding in value that of any other river in the United States or the world.

The woolen manufacturers gave employment in 1890 to 697 wage-earners, and had products valued at \$957,824, as compared with 308 wage-earners, and products valued at \$614,362 in 1890. The importance of the woolen manufacture in Oregon is largely a result of the extensive stock raising interests of the state. The City of Portland is the principal port and railroad center of the state.
