WHOLE FAMILY MURDERED
Awful Crime Committed Near Los Angeles, California.
TRIAL OF THE CONSIDINES
Prominent People Engaged in Smuggling in Seattle—Miss Stone's Abductors Have Been Located.
LOS ANGELES, Cal., Nov. 19.—The dead bodies of A. P. Wilcox, wife and two year old son were found in their home at Downey today. All the bodies were horribly mutilated. Mr. Wilcox and family had been shot and then literally cut to pieces with a knife. There is no clue to the murders.
The Considine Case
SEATTLE, Wash., Nov. 19.—The Considine case will not go to the jury before Thursday afternoon, unless counsel yet to be heard in argument occupy much less time than those by whom argument was today begun. The whole forenoon session and the larger share of the afternoon was taken up by John B. Hart, in presenting the opening argument for the state. During the latter part of the afternoon Will H. Morris, for the defense, was heard in part. Morris will continue tomorrow.
Seattle Smugglers.
SEATTLE, Wash., Nov. 19.—Prominent Seattle women, wives and daughters of wealthy business and professional men, according to the United States secret service detectives, have been conducting systematic smuggling operations on a large scale. A large quantity of expensive silks and dress goods were smuggled into this city from Victoria during the past winter.
Bandits Located.
SOFIA, Nov. 19.—It is reported that Consul General Dickinson, the United States diplomatic agent here, has informed the government of Bulgaria that the abductors of Miss Stone with their captives, are concealed in the desile of the Belitza Mountains, near the Smotch district of Dubnitsa, and has requested that troops be sent to surround the place and liberate the captives.
HENRY BLACKMAN RETURNS
Superiority of Oregon Exhibits at Pan-American Exposition.

fruit from every point of view, was the opinion of this able body. This was not only for the United States, but Canada as well.
The forestry department was one of the attractive features of the exposition. The Oregon exhibit occupied one-third of the entire forestry building, and the exhibit was larger than all the rest of the United States and the foreign countries.
There were over 400 specimens and 151 different varieties of Oregon wood. One fir timber that required two flat cars for shipment and was so large that it could not be placed inside the building, attracted much attention. It was 74 feet in length, 36 inches square, weighed 24,000 pounds, and contained over 7,800 feet of lumber.
Another timber 74 feet in length, 20 inches wide and 4 inches thick, without a knot or blemish, commanded great attention.
This building, being close to the government building, was crowded all the time, being in charge of A. J. Johnson, forestry expert and commissioner.
The Oregon mining exhibit was one of the most attractive in the mining building, being in charge of Fred Mullin of Baker City and Capt. W. Miller of Portland.
There were specimens in gold bars, nuggets and quartz, including fine specimens from all the leading mines of Eastern Oregon.
Out of three silver medals awarded to the Pacific coast, Oregon carried off two, and the third went to Nevada.
On reception day in the mining building, many specimens were given away.
In the agricultural department, 8 gold medals were awarded.
This was admitted and conceded by all to be the most handsome booth there. In the way of decoration, and arrangement it was the most elaborate. It was considered the swell booth of the fair.
There were 867 pieces of grains and grasses with 329 varieties.
In the office, there was a scene made from 57 stalks of wheat, representing a sunset on the Columbia.
At Oregon grown corn, Eastern people were greatly surprised. There were specimens of corn seventeen feet six inches in height; rye, eight feet two inches tall; oats, seven feet six inches tall that produced 122 bushels to the acre. Wheat, seven feet and over, timothy with heads sixteen inches in length; field peas with vines over twelve feet in length.
New York hop growers frankly acknowledged that they could not compete with Oregon in growing hops.
When wheat was shown that had yielded from 24 to 65 bushels to the acre, people could not conceal their admiration, and a great many wanted some of it for seed.
Mr. Blackman stated that taking it all in all, for the small appropriation it was a representative display.
All of the attendants representing Oregon, worked hard and all had a word of praise for Col. H. E. Doech. The night before leaving the Oregon representatives presented him with a beautiful gold pen and holder as a token of their appreciation of his efforts. That he was a man of great executive ability with interests of the state at heart.
Mr. Blackman spoke very highly of Mrs. Edyth Tozier Wethered who is doing good work for Oregon and also for the Lewis and Clark Centennial.
He said that the death of President McKinley took the life out of the fair. The morning his death was announced a great many people were crying on the grounds.
The illuminations were grand.
Two prizes were awarded to Oregon wool, which was superior to anything there.
Mr. Blackman has partially regained his health and is glad to get home again. He says there is no place like Oregon.
