EXTENSIVE IMPROVEMENTS.

Light and Water Company Will Put in Circulating Water System.

The Heppner Electric Light and Water company is now making arrangements to soon commence a big lot of improvements in the Heppner water system.

All dead end pipes will be discarded, and what is known as a circulating system will be inaugurated.

The work will be commenced right away. The improvements will cost in the neighborhood of \$8000.

All of the original mains that were laid when the system was put in, will be taken up. The old mains will all be cleaned and subjected to a test of 200 pounds pressure. The piping standing the test will be redipped and put into use again.

Owing to the taking out of some of the mains and extension of the system, it will be necessary to put in a large amount of new pipe. Last week the company received a carload of new pipe for this purpose.

The extension of the water system will necessitate more or less improvement of the plant. A condenser will be put in which will increase the engine power about 25 per cent.

The company has purchased a tract of land from James Jones, fronting on Willow creek in order to get water to run the condenser.

The work of putting in pipe from Willow creek to the power house is now under way.

The company is now figuring on the proposition of boring a new well to increase the water supply.

Manager Pruyn informs the GAZETTE that while the mains are being taken up hose connections will always be in readiness to insure fire protection.
