Not Ready to Say.

State Senator J. N. Williamson is not yet ready definitely to announce his candidacy either for the Congressional nomination in opposition to Hon. Malcolm A. Moody, or for Secretary of State against F. I. Dunbar, says the Oregonian. Senator Williamson returned Thursday from the annual meeting of the National Livestock Association, which was held recently in Chicago, and has been in conference here with party leaders. To an Oregonian reporter Mr. Williamson dictated the following statement yesterday:

"The unsettled condition of the political situation in Eastern Oregon, and, in fact, in the entire state, makes it impossible for me to make a definite announcement of any candidacy at present. My friends know that it has been my desire to go before the state convention as a candidate for Secretary of State. I have had no intention of flitting with two nominations, but circumstances may so shape themselves that I may be compelled to forego my ambition. Regarding my possible candidacy for Congress, I shall be governed more or less by conditions, as is every man in public life. It is early yet to discuss nominations to be made next Summer."

SHOCKING ACCIDENT.

Ed. Berry Fell on Wood Saw and Lost Leg.

IONE, Oregon, Dec. 14, 1901.

Ed. Berry was seriously injured this morning at about 9 o'clock, while at work with Blake's wood saw in Ione.

The saw was at work at Walter Caeson's home sawing slashwood. Mr. Berry acting as engineer. He took occasion himself to go toward where the other men were sawing but on the opposite from them, and warned them to be careful as the saw was jumping. He got too close to the fly wheel and his clothing caught either in that or on the shaft near the saw when quick as a flash he was wound up and whirled over the frame where the saw was running at a rapid rate, and was fearfully cut on his right leg above, below and at the knee. His leg was cut almost entirely off at the knee, and above and the fleshy part of the leg below the knee was horribly mutilated and torn. No artery, fortunately, was severed. The machinery was stopped with all possible haste, and Dr. Reid was summoned. He dressed the wound as well as could be done temporarily. The train from Heppner was just pulling into Ione, and was held there until the unfortunate man could receive temporary treatment, when he was taken aboard the train bound for the hospital at Portland.

Dr. Reid and Walter Hill accompanied him.

Mr. Berry has been employed here for about a year as engineer and as painter and paperhanger. He was much liked here. The whole town is shocked over the sad accident.

OREGON WELL REPRESENTED.

At National Livestock Association. W. O. Minor Purchased Short Horns.

M. D. Wisdom returned from Chicago Tuesday night, to Portland, where he was one of Oregon's delegates to the annual convention of the National Livestock Association. The convention was both important and representative, a large number of the leading breeders and others interested in the raising of all kinds of livestock being present from all parts of the Union, says the Oregonian.

In speaking of the business transacted at the assembly, Mr. Wisdom said that what would be of the most benefit to Oregon was a resolution introduced and carried asking Congress to pass a law prohibiting the use of shoddy woolen goods and placing them on the market as pure woolsens. They want to compel the manufacturers to mark the percentage of shoddy contained in the goods on them, so that the consumer may know what he is purchasing. Shoddy has been used to such an extent of late that the price of wool has been materially decreased, and by the passage of such a law the prices would be placed at the old standard and the woolgrower would be given a larger profit, and at the same time the consumer would receive a better material at about the same price.

The question of leasing the public domain for grazing purposes was also taken up at this meeting. The question has been before the association for two years and has brought forth much discussion. The sheepmen have always opposed the measure and the cattlemen as warmly favored it. At the last meeting the sheep men were so strongly represented that the cattlemen did not think it advisable to bring up the question.

At one point the convention struck a hard blow at the dairying interests of this state. That was when the oleomargarine bill was taken up. The association voted against the Grant bill, which taxes oleomargarine, by a large majority.

In order that the bills spoken of, and the numerous others passed upon, shall be given proper attention among the lawmakers, a representative of the association will be sent to Congress to look after them. In all probability, J. W. Springer, the president of the association, will be the man detailed to do the work.

Oregon was well represented at the meeting. Those present were: State Senator J. N. Williamson, of Crook County; W. O. Minor, Morrow County; Frank Brown, North Yamhill, representing Charles E. Ladd's farm; C. B. Wade, Pendleton; C. J. Mills, livestock agent of the O. R. & N.; R. C. Jackson, industrial agent of the O. R. & N.; J. G. Edwards, Baldwin Sheep & Land Company, Hay Creek; and M. D. Wisdom, of the Rural Spirit.

Mr. Wisdom also visited the International Stock Show, which was held in the Union Stock Yards at the same time of the convention, although it is entirely a separate organization. Breeders from all over the world pronounced it the greatest show of the kind ever held. The Chicago papers reported the number of animals exhibited as being over 10,000, and a number of exhibitors could not get space for their animals. Cattle were shown from all parts of the world, including some from the Queen Victoria farm, from Scotland, and sheep from France. The only exhibit from the far West was F. W. Godding's sheep, in carload lots, from Idaho. These sheep, raised on the nutritious grasses of the West, took the first prize, competing against corn-fed sheep. In connection with the show was a sale. Several shorthorn cows sold for \$600, and one Hereford for \$450. The sale of 70 head of shorthorns averaged \$40 per head, and about the same number of Herefords averaged \$50. The cattle were bought by breeders throughout the United States. A number of purchases were made by Oregon men. Frank Brown bought a carload of shorthorns for Charles E. Ladd, W. O. Minor made a similar purchase, C. B. Wade, of Pendleton, bought a carload of Herefords, and the W. S. Ladd estate secured a number of fine Berkshire hogs. A large amount of this livestock was imported from the old country.

The industrial building of the State Reform School, about three miles from Salem, was destroyed by fire between 1 and 2 o'clock Wednesday morning. No one was injured. The loss will reach \$25,000; insurance, \$8,000. For a time it seemed as if all the Reform School buildings would be destroyed. There are about 120 boys confined in the institution.

Alexander Meldrum, who was convicted last year on the charge of horse-stealing, was sentenced by Judge Eakin, in the Circuit Court, to serve three years in the penitentiary. Meldrum was indicted jointly with Manny Howard, but demanded a separate trial. The first trial resulted in a hung jury and the second in conviction. Meldrum has always borne a good reputation until the past year or so, when he began to associate with Howard, the noted stock rustler of Eastern Oregon. A strong fight was made to clear him, and the jury was out 24 hours before it returned a verdict of guilty and commended him to the mercy of the court. Meldrum's conviction disposes of leaders of the Howard gang of stock rustlers, which the Stockmen's Association have worked for years to convict.
