Heppner played The Dalles boys last year and won easily, and no doubt will do same this season. Our boys don't know the meaning of defeat in a football game, having never been scored against.

The Oregon Agricultural College will conduct a farmers' short course at Corvallis from January 14 to February 14, 1902, and urges all who can, to attend and take advantage of this excellent opportunity. It is an extended farmers' institute for farmers and farmers' boys; four weeks of popular lectures and practical demonstrations on farm topics, and will be of immense value to all who will take the time and trouble to attend. The course will be free.

The last finishing touches to the new flouring mill have been completed, the machinery is all in place, and it now awaits the turning on of the electric power from White River to put it in motion. The mill has a capacity of 500 barrels a day, and that amount of flour will be turned out regularly as soon as the machinery is started, which will be about the first of next month. The mill is owned by the Waco Warehouse Milling Company, which was reorganized last spring with a capital stock of \$300,000. The company owns besides the mill the Waco warehouse, The Dalles electric plant and the power plant at the falls of White river, 2 1/2 miles south of The Dalles.—Dalles Times-Mountaineer.

The block upon which the building stands was donated to Wheeler County by H. Kelsay, a pioneer stockman, and is situated in the heart of the flourishing town of Fossil.

W. O. Minor returns.

From a Visit to the International Live Stock Show at Chicago.

W. O. Minor, the well known breeder of fine stock, and business man has returned from an extended Eastern and Southern trip.

The main object of his Eastern trip was to attend the annual meeting of the International Stock Show, as a delegate from Oregon.

Mr. Minor left Heppner on the 23rd of November and went to Denver, Colo., where he visited his brother, Arthur Minor for a couple of days.

From Denver he went to Cedar Rapids, Iowa, to visit relatives, and from there went to Chicago to attend the International Live Stock Show.

Mr. Minor was in Chicago for eight days taking in the show, and as the exhibit was admitted to be the greatest show ever held in the world, he was a very interested visitor.

The meeting was held at the immense Studebaker hall, but the accommodations were not sufficient.

Going on at the same time there were three judging rings of Shorthorns, Herefords and Angus cattle, and to show the magnitude of the show it took a week in deciding the premiums in each class.

Cattle from England, Scotland, Canada and all over the United States were there for exhibition.

Mr. Minor being mostly interested in the Shorthorn class spent most of his time at this ring. He says that he got much valuable information. He saw the sale of the celebrated cow that brought \$6,000 at public auction. At this sale where the Marr cow was sold Mr. Minor purchased a Scotch bred yearling bull of C. C. Norton, of Conning, Iowa. For this calf he paid \$700.

While the very best show cattle in the world were on exhibition at this show, Mr. Minor states that if he had had his herd there he could have won premiums.

He was there for close observation and to see how his herd would compare with the finest cattle in the country. He comes home thoroughly satisfied with his herd and with a feeling that his cattle would make a good showing with any in the country.

Mr. Minor's Southern trip was for the purpose of looking up a market for the better grades of his cattle.

From Chicago he went through Indiana, Kentucky, Mississippi and down to New Orleans. After leaving Chicago he was accompanied by J. O. Williams of this place.

He took a great interest in watching the picking and marketing of cotton by the negroes. He says that the southern country is slow and is far behind the north in vim and enterprise.

The farms are very poorly cultivated and produce more weeds than anything else.

From New Orleans Mr. Minor came back by way of the Southern Pacific, and passed through the recent discovered oil fields in the vicinity of Beaumont, Texas.

In Louisiana he saw the darkies cutting and hauling sugar cane.

With the system of irrigating rice fields in Texas, Mr. Minor was very much impressed. Mammoth pumps are used, raising water from 30 to 60 feet at the rate of from 30,000 to 120,000 gallons a minute. With these pumps the rice fields are flooded during the growing season. He is of the opinion that all along the arid region through which the Columbia river flows in Oregon, this same irrigating system could be worked satisfactorily.

On his way home Mr. Minor stopped at Los Angeles, Cal., for a day and a half. He intends to show his herd at Sacramento next year, where he is given good encouragement to show the class of cattle that he handles. Mr. Minor says that he had some acquaintance with Louisiana mosquitoes, and he said they were entirely too familiar for such short acquaintance.

Mr. Minor was glad to get home and says that the people of Oregon ought to be satisfied, particularly the people of Eastern Oregon.

For the improvement of his herd, Mr. Minor does not lack enterprise nor does he spare expense to get the best strains of blood that money can buy. At his Mountain Valley farm he now has 80 head of Shorthorns. At the head of the herd is Collision, the great bull, Sallie Girl the sweetest cow, Rosa O'Grady, This cow was shown with Ruberta, now the champion cow of the world. Sanae Francis, the champion calf at Chicago in 1900, and many other prize winners.
