Arrangements are being made for another rabbit drive at the mouth of Butter creek as soon as snow falls. While about 4000 rabbits were slaughtered at the last drive, it is said that the rabbits are now just as numerous as ever in the locality where the drive occurred on December 29. They congregate in the Butter creek valley for the winter as it is warmer than on the hills and also to feed on the tender alfalfa sprouts that spring up during the winter. These rabbits are principally blacktails and they breed much faster than the jacks. It is a matter of business with the stockmen to get rid of these animals as they clean out the range equal to a band of sheep. Not like the rabbits in Australia which are such a great pest, devastating an immense territory, the black tails do not burrough in the ground and are comparatively easy to get rid of.

Views of an Outsider.

A correspondent to the American Wool and Cotton Reporter, signing himself "The Old Observer," who visited Heppner last fall, furnishes quite a lengthy and interesting letter. The following excerpts are taken from the article:

"A view in the Main street of the town by daylight from October to May from whatever standpoint, is invariably picturesque. Ranchers for 20 and 25 miles around are in once a week at least and coming on different days, from different sections, from one end of the week to the other, they are in evidence. They come in backs, in carriages, and on horseback, and the times of arrival and departure will vary so that all day long, like a "moving picture" in a show, one beholds the composite exhibit, ranchers who dwell in the country, ranchers who dwell in the town, perambulating the sidewalks, or crossing the way, entering the bank or the stores, passing in knots to converse; herdsmen, ranch hands, travelers, some alighting from their horses, some mounting to depart, young ladies riding leisurely through the village, the objects of admiring glances.

"There are some fine residences in town, and a large number of comfortable ones. There is a solid population of eminently respectable citizens, a half dozen churches, yet there is no place where young men can congregate and come in contact with that which tends to elevate them mentally and spiritually.

"The East Oregonian of Morrow never hurries. He does not have to. He would not if he had. He gets there just the same. Everything comes to him. If he's a stockman, he hires help who hang around with horses, cattle or sheep. They would have come upon their arms and backs, but for the fact that they ride into town, and by change of position keep up the circulation. The proprietor is usually a man of keen business instinct, but he never exerts himself physically.

"The rancher who raises grain, bestirs himself somewhat to get in the wheat crop. This is necessary, but the amount of manual labor required, is not alarming, and rye can be raised year after year on the stubble. The grain rancher, like him of the stock ranch, waits a portion of the year for his stake. Nineteen times in 20 he makes it. Money flows in to him.

"All of them (ranchers) have their bank accounts, and can draw their checks for any reasonable amount. The whole tendency of things is to make one Micawberish.

"I wonder indeed, why the public spirited citizens of Heppner, who are not a few, have not moved are now for the establishment of a public library and reading room. A good many young men, whose lives now bid fair to be blighted by the drink habit and attendant evils, might otherwise be saved for careers of usefulness.

"The schools of the municipality are generally fostered. My friend, J. H. Hager, who is chairman of the board of directors of the public schools, informs me that the central building cost \$8,000, and quite \$6,000 is annually appropriated for the expenses of maintaining the department. The teachers' salaries amount to \$4,500. There is, too, genuine interest manifested on the part of the ranchers far and near, and many of the pupils will be found to have been brought in here by their parents, expressly to afford them advantages which the isolated position of the ranch house forbade their otherwise enjoying.

"One entering Heppner this fall, for the first time, and seeing a number of new stone buildings in process of erection, would imagine that a boom had struck the place, but Uncle Bill Ayers, who has known this section for now nearly four decades, assures me that the current movement is only a phase of the healthy development which has for years been aimed. The town is steadily growing.

"Heppner is a prominent shipping point for grain, wool and mutton sheep."

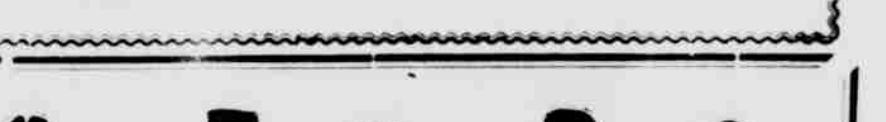
