It has been recommended by the republican state committee that the primary elections be held on March 23d. This emphasizes the necessity of registering. At this time only a small per cent of the voters of Morrow county have registered. Voters who intend to vote must register. A few minutes time now taken to register will save a whole lot of trouble later on.

It certainly looks bad for Mr. Moody with his home paper, The Dalles Chronicle, the leading paper of Wasco county, will not support him, in fact is absolutely opposed to him. The voice of the people of Eastern Oregon is heard in the press. The political machine wants Moody. The people want Williamson. In a nutshell, this is the congressional situation.

The new tax law deals openly, fairly and in a businesslike way with taxpayers. The rebate of 8 per cent allowed for the payment of the amount of each individual tax within 30 days from the date of the opening of the tax roll is an ordinary business procedure, which should make the sheriff's office a busy place between now and the 15th of March. Let taxpayers do their part to simplify the tax system under which they have so long chafed by making prompt payment, taking care to file their receipts away carefully, thus reducing taxes to their lowest terms, and making lighter a burden which cannot by any possibility be cast off.—Oregonian.

At the present time the outlook for Morrow county is very favorable. There will be a large wool clip of excellent quality. Eastern and foreign wool markets now present encouraging prospects. With the assurance of a big clip and a favorable outlook for good prices, sheep men are in good spirits. While the market for mutton sheep is a little off, not being as good as it was last year, still this one but very little figure as the wool industry is the main feature. The wheat acreage in Morrow county this season is the largest in the history of the county, and a great portion of it is summer-fallow land. Reports from the wheat districts indicate good prospects. The rains of last fall gave wheat a start and it has made considerable growth during the winter. With a large wool clip and a good wheat crop, Morrow county will be prosperous.

COST OF THE BOER WAR.

The British War Office has published a summary of the losses of the army from the beginning of the war in South Africa until the 31st of last month. Deaths and permanent disabilities have taken 25,395 men out of the fighting line. The actual casualties of the war are, however, much greater. Including the surviving wounded and the invalided, the total casualties amount to 52,410 officers and 109,791 men. Thus 80,536 officers and men have either been restored to duty or are in a fair way to rejoin their commands. There were 61,330 sent back to England as invalids, suffering chiefly from the fever of the field, the great majority of whom have recovered and been returned to their regiments.

course, too low, for one made at the beginning of the year 1901 placed the number of Boers then in the field at about 19,000 or 20,000. Even that was possibly an underestimate, if we assume that the British returns of Boer losses through the year are correct. In these returns, 18,320 burghers are said to have been withdrawn from the scene of conflict. Of these 1717 were killed, 1244 wounded, 9756 taken prisoners and 2759 surrendered. If the estimates of a year ago were correct, these figures would leave only from 700 to 1700 Boers still in the field, which is manifestly below the actual number, as according to British reports there are many commandos still operating at various points in the Transvaal, Orange River Colony and Cape Colony, some of which contain from 1000 to 1500 men.

The war is costing the British now about \$22,500,000 per month. During a part of the time the cost amounted to \$1,000,000 per day. The total cost up to the present time aggregates about \$1,000,000,000. The expenditures last year reached the sum of \$464,500,000 and the estimated cost this year is placed by the War Secretary at \$305,250,000.

SHEEP NOTES.

The wolves and coyotes have become such a nuisance in Arizona that the sheep men and cattle men have organized and are preparing for a wolf and coyote round-up. The dogs which will take part in this round up are cross-bred grey and stag hounds.

J. A. Rankin of LaSalle, Colo., sold last week on the Omaha market a bunch of Colorado-Mexican lambs, 145 head averaging 75 pounds at \$6. Mr. Rankin also sent in a load of Colorado ewes that were good enough to bring \$4.

Near Great Falls, in Montana, large prairie fires have been raging, which have endangered the sheep greatly. In the Sweet Grass Hills much hay has been spoiled and the sheep men have found it necessary to move their sheep to another range.

The Colorado lamb feeders feel jubilant over the ideal winter they are having for feeding. They claim that their lambs never looked better at this time of the year. The feeders lost so much money last year that they were more particular in picking their lambs this year and as a result the lambs that will be marketed this spring will be of a better class than have been marketed for several years.

Another big land sale has been made by the land department of the Northern Pacific to McGregor Bros., the sheep kings of Whitman county, Washington. The land which is 23,000 acres of grazing lands in the extreme western part of the county, is unfit for agricultural purposes, but furnishes good pasture for sheep and cattle. The price paid has not been made public, but is reported to be about \$1 per acre.

C. W. McComas, of Pendleton, and W. R. Russell of Moscow, Idaho, both prominent wheat buyers, have been spending a few days in Portland, says the Oregonian. Mr. McComas reports Umatilla county more thoroughly cleaned out of wheat than it has been at a similar period for many years. He estimates the stocks still on hand in the county at not to exceed 400,000 bushels, or about 10 per cent of the crop. The amount still held in the county will be insufficient to meet the demands of the mills until another crop is available. The percentage still unsold in Walla Walla county is greater than in Umatilla county, and some of the wheat held there will be needed to meet the milling demand in Umatilla county. Mr. Russell reports a similar condition of affairs in Latah county, Idaho, and estimates the amount still on hand in the county at from 100,000 to 120,000 bushels, an amount so small in comparison to the crop harvested, that it is almost a perfect clean up of the crop.
