OUR EXPORTS AND THE WORLD'S MARKETS.

When the drought of last summer was at its worst the popular impression was that there would be great suffering among our farmers and a noticeable decrease in our agricultural exports.

show that wheat and other products went abroad in larger quantities and at increased prices.

There was a fall in our exports of manufactured goods from \$441,406,000 in 1900 to \$385,144,000 in 1901.

If the loss in exports of manufactured goods extended to all departments, it might be laid to the very general agitation in England and continental Europe to promote hostility to American manufactures.

This theory is borne out by the fact that there was in 1901 a heavy increase in the exportation of agricultural implements, in cars and carriages, and in electrical machinery.

Our exports of cotton cloths fell in 1900 to \$14,372,000, mainly because of the disturbance in China.

In no department of trade, then, has the concerted movement of the European governments against American manufactures had any perceptible effect.

But the Americans having already invaded the European markets, and having had opportunity to convince the people of the high grade of American manufactures, have gained a most important point in the struggle for mastery in the markets of the world.

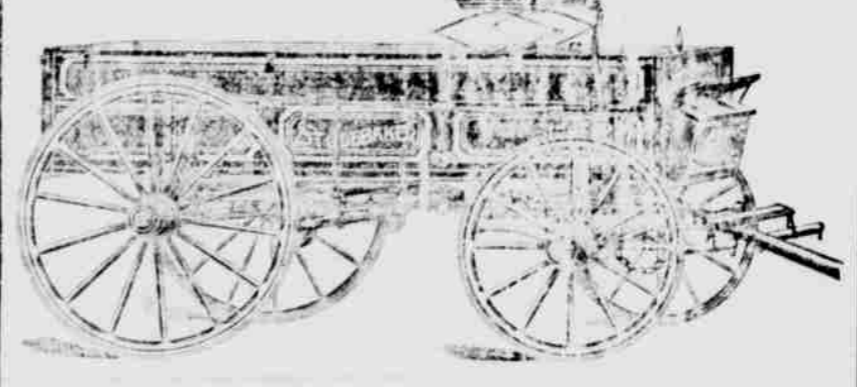
