But as the loss is confined to those branches of manufacture in which the mills have been unable to supply the home demand, and as our steel and iron products in 1901 exceeded in volume those of any previous year. the loss in exports must be charged to our insbility to meet the full toreign demand.

This theory is borne out by the fact that there was in 1901 a heavy increase in the exportation of agricultural implements, in cars and carriages, and in electrical machinery. Outside of steel products. there was a noticeable increase in cotton cloth, in boots and shoes,

and in woolen manufactures. Our exports of cotton cloths fell in 1900 to \$14,372,000, mainly because of the disturbance in China. As soon as peace was restored and good order assured, there was increased demand from China, and in 1901 our exports of cotton cloths rose to \$19,885,000. There has been in nearly every European country, an agitation against American shoes, but in spite of this our exports of boots and shoes increased from \$4,626,000 in 1900 to \$5,997,000 in 1901.

The breed in this respect has been well maintained in Eastern Oregon, and the animals have had sufficient roughing to be hardened for the hardships of the Northern winter.

"For the privilege of bringing American horses into the British Yukon, I had to pay 20 per cent duty, but I found it to my advantage. Others seem to have had the same experience. I should say 80 per cent of the horses now in Dawson and other parts of the Yukon are from Eastern Oregon. and have been brought here at an extra expense of duty, the same as HEFFER. I paid. 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
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
