For Republican County Convention.

PRIMARIES 12TH

Above Dates Fixed at Meeting of Morrow County Central Committee 53 Delegates in Convention.

The Republican County Central Committee met at the court house Saturday afternoon at 2 o'clock.

There was a fair representation of delegates from the different precincts of the county.

Owing to the absence of Chairman R. F. Hynd, J. B. Carmichael of Lexington was elected chairman.

Chairman Carmichael stated that the main object of the meeting was for the apportionment of delegates, and to fix the date for the primaries and the county convention.

After some discussion it was decided to apportion the delegates on a basis of the vote cast for M. A. Moody, two years ago. This decision was acceptable to all. One delegate will be allowed to every 15 votes or fractional part over one half, and one delegate at large, the aggregate being 53 delegates all told for the 15 precincts in the county.

The new precincts that were created by the county court at the January term, under the new law, caused some discussion. The apportionment was finally settled in a satisfactory manner.

By motion, South Lone was allowed three, and North Lone two delegates.

By motion, Heppner and Madison precinct were allowed seven delegates each.

By motion, M. S. Maxwell's office was designated as the voting place for North Lone.

For South Lone, Walker's hall was designated as a voting place.

The chairman and Secretary were instructed to find a suitable voting place for Madison precinct.

It was unanimously agreed to hold the primaries on Wednesday, March 12, and to hold the county convention on the following Saturday, the 15th.

Everything was in perfect harmony at the meeting and the apportionment is entirely satisfactory.

The apportionment of delegates will be found in the call for the primaries and convention published elsewhere in this paper.

Democratic Committee Meeting.

The Democratic Central Committee of Morrow county will meet on Saturday, March Eighth, at 2 o'clock p. m., at the court house, Heppner. Business of importance will come before the meeting, including naming date for holding primaries and convention, and apportioning delegates.

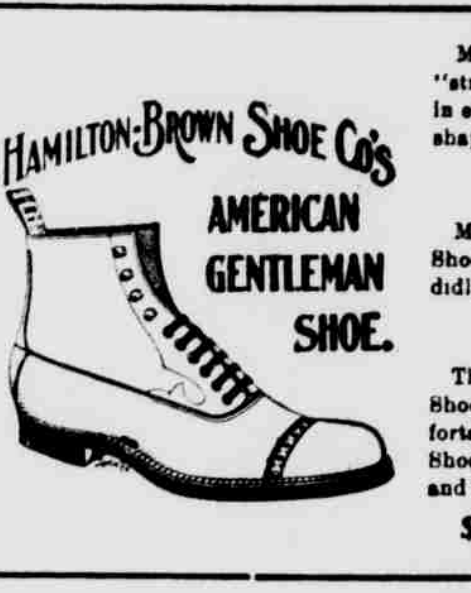

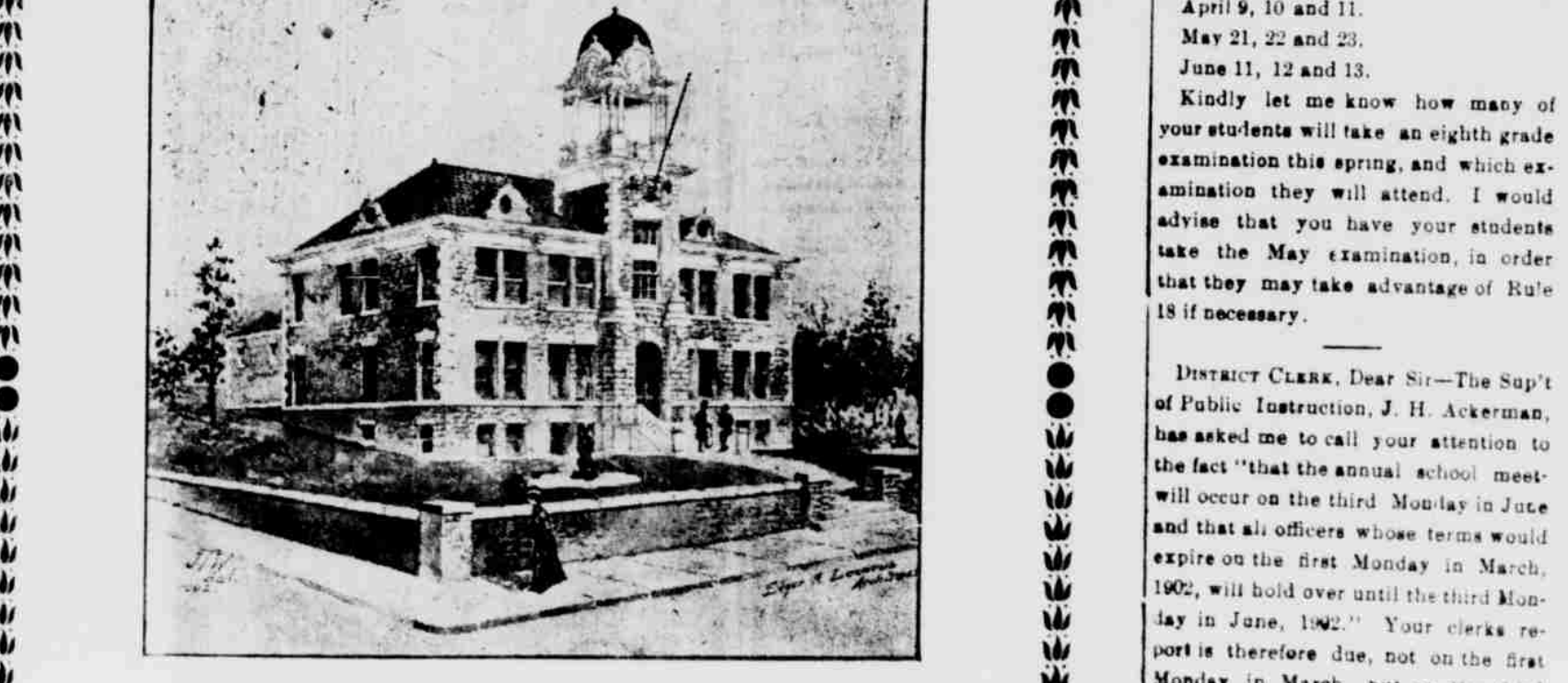

PLAN FOR MORROW COUNTY'S NEW COURT HOUSE

The building will be 52 feet 6 inches in width by 82 feet in length. It will be built of blue stone with light or sandstone trimmings. The building complete, all furnished, with four fire-proof vaults, and jail annex, and a \$1000 clock, including all improvements of the grounds, etc. will cost not to exceed \$24,000. \$2000 of this amount has been donated by citizens of Heppner, making the cost to the taxpayers of Morrow county not to exceed \$22,000. It will be a modern building, heated by steam and lighted by electricity.

CITY COUNCIL.

Petition Granted—Custodian of Fire Apparatus Appointed.

There was a regular meeting of the city council at the council chamber Monday evening, Mayor Gilliam presiding with a full board of councilmen present with the exception of Phil Colm.

A petition asking to build a new sidewalk on the west side of Court street was granted.

Petitions of J. C. Borchers and McAtee & Swagart praying for renewal of license to sell liquors was granted, the principals having deposited the proper amount of cash.

O. E. Farnsworth who was elected councilman at last city election and who went East before qualifying for the office, was appointed to the office to which he was elected by the council.

Frank Natter was appointed custodian of the fire apparatus of the city. He will have charge of the carts, hose, etc., and is to keep everything in proper shape, at a salary of \$20 per month. This was formerly paid to the hose
