CAPTURED BY THE BOERS
General Methuen Taken Prisoner and Four Guns Secured.
THE BRITISH BADLY BEATEN
Secretary Long Has Resigned—Representative Moody of Massachusetts Selected to Take His Place in Cabinet.
London, March 10.—General Lord Methuen and four guns have been captured by General Delarey. General Methuen was wounded in the thigh. Three British officers and forty-eight men were killed. Five British officers and seventy-two men were wounded. One British officer and 200 men are missing. The fight occurred before dawn on March 7th between Windburg and Lichtenburg, Orange River Colony. The British force numbered 1200 men. The Boers captured all British baggage. General Methuen is retained as a prisoner.
News in London.
London, Mar. 10.—When it was announced that General Lord Methuen and four guns had been captured by the Boers, commanded by General Delarey, the news came like a thunderbolt to London. Bitter remarks were passed on the subject of the government's declaration that the war in South Africa was over. The news came too late to affect business on the stock exchange, but excited curb dealings quickly followed the closing, in which the South African slumped heavily. The news caused great excitement in the mine market.
The news was received in the House of Commons amid great excitement. The reading of Lord Kitchener's telegram was listened to in deep silence, which was broken by loud Irish cheers. Instantly there were cries of "Shame, Shame," from the Government benches. Then the Irish members seemed to think better of their outburst, and suddenly subsided.
The feeling of depression in the lobbies of the House of Commons, over the news of the disaster was very marked. The relief was widely expressed that the Boers will not fail to take advantage of Methuen's prominence, to hold him as a hostage for the safety of Commandant Kritzinger and other Boer leaders, now in the hands of the British.
Long Steps Out
Washington, March 10.—The third change in the Cabinet of President

Roosevelt occurred today, when Secretary Long submitted his resignation in a beautiful letter, it being accompanied by one equally felicitous by the President. The change was made complete by the selection of Representative William Henry Moody, of the sixth Congressional district of Massachusetts, as Mr. Long's successor in the Navy Department.
This change has been expected for a long time. Mr. Long had intended to retire at the beginning of the late President McKinley's second term, but he consented to remain until certain lines of policy in which he was involved were more satisfactorily arranged. Then when President Roosevelt succeeded, though anxious to return to private life—for Secretary Long will never again enter public life—a strong feeling of loyalty toward Mr. Roosevelt induced the Secretary to defer his retirement until it was convenient for the President to make a change. Recently Mr. Long has been in Massachusetts making arrangements with his old legal connections to re-enter the practice of law, and he has had his house at Hingham put in order for his occupation. When Mr. Long entered the Cabinet originally he was an active member of the firm of Hemingway & Long, a well-known legal firm of Boston. He has always maintained a silent connection with the concern, and will again become an active partner.
Freight Men Strike.
Boston, March 10.—The strike of the freight handlers of this city, which threatened to involve 10,000 men, was begun early today. The team drivers' union, No. 21, embracing about 6,000 men, led off. Other unions followed. The strike grows out of the Brine Transportation Company's troubles with its teamsters, which began several weeks ago, but was precipitated by the refusal on Saturday of members of the Freight handlers' Union to take care of merchandise carted by non-union teamsters employed by the Brine Company. The Team Drivers' Union embraces nearly all the drivers handling freight in the city.
Stopping work because of the discharge of Union men, the various organizations made every effort today to extend their sphere of influence to affiliated bodies, while corporations energetically tried to fill the strikers' places. Both met with some sure success. Tomorrow the local employees of the great express companies, the Adams and the New York and Boston, which handle practically all fast freight in Southern New England, will refuse to work, while several smaller bodies of organized labor, such as brewery teamsters and piano movers, as well as the freight handlers in East Boston, will be idle.
The predictions are that the longshoremen numbering 4,000 will strike, together with 2,000 Knight of Labor freight handlers employed by the Boston & Maine road, and 1,000 men in other unions, when their assistance is needed. If all these laborers cease work the striking force will be over 14,000 men.
Enormous Tidal Wave.
San Francisco, March 10.—The steamer Newport, from Central American and Mexican ports, brings a few details of the recent disaster between La Libertad and a point thirty miles north of Acapulco. A terrific tidal wave burst over all that length of the coast, and it was said fifty-three bodies had been recovered. The wave rolled in like a mountain, and over embankments, covering them to a height of four or five feet, completely inundating the whole coast, and almost wiping out the small buildings in La Libertad and Acapulco. When the steamer left, the work of rescuing the remains had only just begun.

STOCK AND WOOL NOTES.
Ed Day has finished shearing 1700 fleeces.
Friday of last week, Ed Day finished shearing his fine Merino hucks, 1700 in number. The fleeces averaged about 18 pounds. Mr. Day's sheep are so well known that the local demand takes about all that he has to sell.
Sheep that have been sheared are doing well. The fine springlike weather is very favorable, and there will be no loss.
All the sheep shearing in the vicinity of Moss, Arizona, has been finished and all the wool sold except two lots. The heaviest buyer was Mr. Salter, of Boston, and the price he paid, f. o. b., ranged from 14 to 15 cents. Last season wool only brought from 13 to 14 1/2 cents in the East, so the price this year are very favorable to the seller. The season's shear will foot up considerably over 100,000 pounds of fine wool as ever went to market.
Sheep feeders in Weld county, Colorado, are feeling better this year than last; the prospects for good markets are encouraging, the number being fed is about one-half that of last season and all things point to a fairly profitable year. Last year some estimates placed the number of sheep being fed in Colorado at one million head, though it is fair to presume the figures too high by 150,000. This year there are less than half a million being fattened for the eastern markets. Last year corn was worth by the carload, delivered 90 and 95 cents per hundred pounds; this year it is 30 cents higher. Last year alfalfa hay was worth in stack \$2.50 to \$3 a ton; this year it is worth from \$3 to \$3.50. The fall of 1900 lambs were quoted at a fair figure; last fall they were higher. Yet notwithstanding the increased prices of feed and lambs, the feeders stand to make a fair profit on their investments and labor.
There are three times as many sheep on the Red desert, Wyoming, as the range will support, and the flock masters of Sweetwater and Carbon counties are confronted by a serious problem. Feed is scarce and the snow-fall short, resulting in all of the flocks being bunched in a small area of the best country. The feed is being rapidly consumed and when it is gone there is no place to which the flocks can be moved. The sheepmen themselves predict serious losses, but do nothing to relieve the situation. In addition to the other troubles the Utah sheep, which were recently driven from leased land, have not left the country, but are hovering about the southern border of the desert, subsisting as best they may and constantly threatening invasion.
