PRESIDENT ROOSEVELT WISE.

Reid's invitation to accompany them to King Edward's coronation, and also Emperor William's request that she visit Berlin as his guest.

From the viewpoint of our laws the family of the President of the United States has no official existence. Its members have no rights or privileges whatever above or beyond those which are the inheritance of every American citizen.

It is impossible, however, to bring this fact to the comprehension of Europeans with such clearness that they will instinctively treat members of the President's family just as they would treat the Americans.

No matter how great her desire and her effort to be treated merely as any American woman, Miss Roosevelt would not have been so received in London or Berlin. No matter what her protestations, Englishmen and Germans would feel utterly unable to treat her as they would Miss Smith of New York or Miss Jones of Chicago.

To the European mind the President of the United States and his family have something of the inherent claims to consideration conceded to European sovereigns and their families. Since it is impossible to remove this illusion and to make Europeans understand our distinction between the respect given the office and that given the man, it is well that there should be no visiting of European courts and no participation in royal ceremonies by members of the President's family.

Miss Roosevelt's presence at King Edward's coronation, or her visit to the German Emperor, in spite of all official disclaimers and of all assertions that she was there merely as a private person, would inevitably have been construed by all Europe as an indication of special friendliness of the President and of this government to the sovereigns and the governments of those countries.

It would have been construed as a departure from our traditional policy of equal friendship for all foreign nations and special favors to none, and therefore most embarrassing to this government.

President Roosevelt perceived these facts doubtless, and gave his decision in accordance with them.—Inter Ocean.

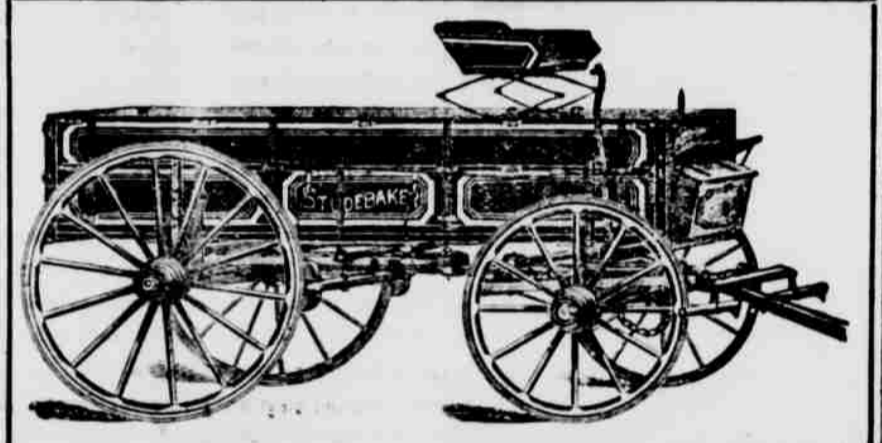
