COURT HOUSE NOTES

Large Amount of Taxes Paid in Under New Law

The court house grounds now present rather a sorry appearance. Everything is all torn up. The work of excavating and grading has been getting along in good shape.

Coyote scalps are beginning to come in lively. At this time of the year many a coyote's home is made desolate by the removal of the scalps from the whole family. There's money in it. Each scalp, from big, little, old or young is worth \$2.

The matrimonial market for the month of March was extremely quiet. Only a few records of license appear.

The contract for building the new court house will be let at the May term of court. Work on the building will be commenced as soon as the contract and bonds are executed.

There was quite a rush at the sheriff's office for a few days prior to Monday by people who desired to pay their taxes before the penalty was added under the new law. Sheriff Matlock informs the GAZETTE that up to Monday he had issued 1270 tax receipts, aggregating \$42,000 in cash that has been paid in for taxes. This leaves only about \$12,000 to be collected, and a part of this is not delinquent, as one half has been paid by many which, under the provisions of the law extends the time until October. About 150 names appear on the roll who have not paid anything, but these are mostly small amounts. At this time last year only 22 tax receipts had been issued.

The democratic county convention which was held in this city, Saturday last, was quite an enthusiastic meeting. Several of the party leaders expressing the opinion that it was the best meeting that had been held here for eight years.

Geo. Wells, chairman of the county central committee, called the meeting to order at 10 o'clock a. m.

C. E. Redfield was elected temporary chairman and appointed A. Leach and S. I. Stratton secretaries.
