S. A. Clarke, the veteran newspaper man who is now in Washington, D. C., in writing to the GAZETTE says: "The Oleomargarine, or Pure Food Bill, is being fought in the Senate, opposition coming from the great meat combine and the cotton seed trusts, that fight the bill. Senator Mitchell makes all the efforts he can for pure foods and against the combine. In brief the substance of an article from the N. Y. Herald, that Senator Mitchell had published in the Congressional Record Monday is as follows: "The great Chicago Meat Combine covers the meat business of the United States, doing a business of \$600,000,000, and puts up prices to buyers as well as puts them down to the stock growers of the western ranges. The Herald says there has recently been a raise of prices to consumers of 3 to 4 cts. a pound on beef, mutton and pork, in all Eastern cities; this is hard on the poor, who find fresh meats placed at prices they cannot afford. Four firms do a business of \$500,000,000, and incidentally control \$600,000,000 of trade. Whole sale and retail dealers, who will not sign an iron clad agreement are driven out of business, as they are cut off from supplies and undersold by agencies established for the purpose. "This combination will not bid against each other, if the range owner will not take the price one offers, no other will bid higher, and he can hold his cattle. Sellers are forced to come to their terms—or keep their stock. Competition is killed off at any cost; prices go up or down to suit them, and any dealer who won't yield to the combine goes out of business."

THE DEMOCRATIC PLATFORM.

If it was only a matter of length, the democratic platform and declaration of principles adopted for the state campaign of 1902, would not be lacking. Instead of an earnest appeal to good judgment, it is made up of fault finding with the Republican party and present conditions. In comparison with the Republican platform, it will get little support from contented and prosperous people. It is a document of discontent which offers but little hope for the relief of the thousand and one evils that are pointed out. In the main portion of interest to the people of Oregon, the Democrats have followed the Republicans, when not finding fault, they have endorsed a great portion of the Republican platform. The Philippine question will be the leading issue. The Democrats want to abandon the Philippines, but the excuse for so doing is lame. There is entirely too much fault finding.

HOW ABOUT THIS?

Representative Moody is desirous of serving as Oregon's member of the Republican Congressional Campaign Committee. It would be desirable to ascertain, before the appointment is made, whether Mr. Moody is sincerely and actively interested in securing the largest possible vote for Mr. Williamson, his victorious rival and successful aspirant for the Republican nomination for Representative from the Second Oregon District. It is believed at The Dalles, Mr. Moody's home town, that his friends are interesting themselves in other directions.

Senator Simon is also reported as desirous of representing Oregon on the Congressional committee. It might be desirable in this case also, before such appointment is made, to ascertain whether Mr. Simon and his adherents here are sincerely and actively interested in the election of the Republican candidate for Congress in the Second Congressional District, in the election of the Republican nominee for Governor and in the election of the Republican nominees for the Legislature which is to choose Mr. Simon's successor. It is sufficiently notorious here that while Mr. Simon himself is absent, his immediate adherents are collaborating upon the formation of a fusion ticket, whose object is the defeat of the Republican nominees for the Legislature and incidentally of the Republican nominee for Governor.

Certain Federal appointments are now held up in Washington because of the inability of the two Oregon Senators to agree. What will Mr. Simon's claim upon a republican president for recognition be worth, if it develops that his lieutenants here, by his orders or consent, are at work for Democratic candidates for the Legislature and a Democratic candidate for Governor?

What is wanted by the Republican party, the administration and congressional committee is a Republican victory here in June that will encourage the party in the summer and fall campaign. They want as large a majority in the Legislature as possible. They will not be inclined to favor the use of Federal patronage to strengthen the hands of a man who is fighting the Republican ticket.

No excuse can be made of a united effort of citizens for the sake of good government. Citizens combine to get an odious machine out of office, but they do not combine to keep a discredited and repudiated machine in office after its own party has turned it out. Citizens combine legitimately in the interest of good government, but they do not combine legitimately to restore to power a boss who has just been dethroned.

There is no way to evade or belittle this plain question. If Senator Simon is in harmony with his party, amenable to its verdicts, loyal in support of its decrees, entitled to its confidence and its honors, he and his friends cannot conceal the fact, but will be active in the party's behalf. If they are conniving for its defeat through selection of Democratic candidates, they cannot conceal that fact, either, but the terms of the fusion will afford indisputable proof of their disloyalty.

The vote of Multnomah county for governor, congressmen and

members of the Legislature will measure the Republicanism of Mr. Simon and his friends. No deception is possible. The vote of Wasco county will measure the Republicanism of Mr. Moody and his friends. No deception is possible. There is an example in Marion county that might be followed with profit elsewhere. The proposed fusion in Multnomah county has for its sole object the defeat of the Republican ticket. A Republican Senator who has any respect for his record or hope for the future should declare himself out of any such arrangement and see that his adherents do likewise.

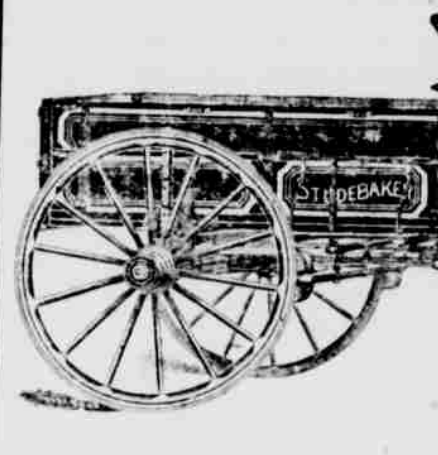
