Peace negotiations in South Africa have been delayed, however, indications are that the war will soon be at an end.

The Baker City Herald estimates that W. J. Furnish will carry Eastern Oregon by 6000 plurality. About 10,000 for the state will be about right.

Another cheap John Portland solicitor was in town this week for a "supply" house. This time it was the printing line. Heppner has well regulated stores, good printing offices, and in fact, every line is well represented.

J. W. Scriber, republican candidate for joint senator, (district No. 22, Morrow, Umatilla and Union) is a man who should, and will receive a big vote, especially in Morrow county. Mr. Scriber is a good man and well qualified, and will represent the district in an able manner. Such men as Mr. Scriber, the GAZETTE is pleased to support and recommend.

The abduction of Miss Stone which was quite profitable for the brigands, bids fair to be also profitable to the missionary. PLATT'S SUBSTITUTE BILL ADOPTED.

The Kahn-Mitchell chinese exclusion bill has been defeated in the Senate, and an amended substitute offered by Platt of Connecticut adopted. As was anticipated,

the Senate was made the battleground of exclusion. The House adopted the Kahn-Mitchell bill without division, and with but few changes in it from its original form. Those Representatives who were opposed to the exclusion of the Asiatic coolies thus escaped being placed on record. This forced the opponents of the bill to concentrate their efforts to defeat it in the Senate. The chief objection to the measure in the latter body centered around the drastic provisions which the Planel Commission, in its eagerness to make politics succeed in engrafting upon it. A good majority of the Senators are true to the principle of Chinese exclusion as it is represented in existing laws and treasury regulations, as is evidenced in the vote by which the amended substitute was adopted.

When introduced, the Platt substitute provided only for the extension of existing exclusion laws until the present treaty between China and the United States terminates. According to the terms of the treaty this will happen on the 7th of December, 1904. Its survival after that date depends upon the sufferance of the two governments. The substitute bill thus left uncovered the Scott bill of 1888, under which the treasury regulations governing Chinese laborers in transit have been promulgated, and made no provision for the Philippine islands. The amendments which have been made to the bill embrace the Scott act of September 13, 1888; extend exclusion to the Philippines, prohibit the migration of Philippine Chinese to mainland territory, and extend the life of the law until such a time as a new treaty may be made with China, should the present be abrogated. To all intents and purposes, the main features of the Kahn-Mitchell bill have consequently been retained. The chief difference lies in the limit which the Platt substitute places on the operation of the exclusion laws, and in the eradication of the provision prohibiting Chinese sailors from being employed on the ships carrying the American flag. The decided stand which the Senate took on that proposition was shown in the vote on the Lodge amendments to strike out the clause from the Kahn-Mitchell bill. The amendment carried by 47 yeas against 29 noes.

The measure must now go to a conference committee of the House and Senate. If the bill adopted by the latter is accepted by the former the same security which we now enjoy against Asiatic coolie invasion will be extended for a period at least. It is unfortunate that this immunity was not made indefinite, for, with the time limitation the Senate has placed upon the operation of the bill, the contentious question is kept alive to irritate and harass us again some future day, when the issue will have to be fought all over again.—S. F. Chronicle.

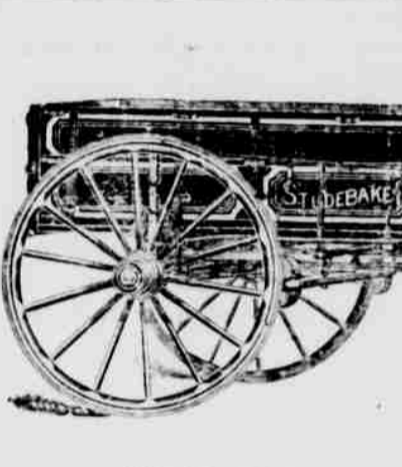
