Everything indicates a quiet campaign, a sort of a "still hunt."

Oregon never was a democratic state. Will the Republicans of Oregon allow the state to be placed in the Democratic column by electing Chamberlain for governor?

Reports from Gilliam county say that our old friend Willard Herren will run like a scared wolf for sheriff. He will be elected and will make Gilliam county a good sheriff.

Mr. Furnish took well with our people. He is a plain, straightforward business man, and an agreeable gentleman, and will poll the full Republican vote of the county.—Salem Statesman.

The Columbia river salmon catch so far this season is equal to that of last year. It is expected that this season's pack will amount to 250,000 cases, not including the 5,500,000 pounds on cold storage. Since this industry started in 1866, it has been the means of distributing over \$75,000,000 along the Columbia and today gives employment to over 5000 men.

Judge Lowell has lost many of his old friends in Morrow county on account of his stand in fighting his fellow townsman, W. J. Furnish, for governor. Mr. Furnish and Judge Lowell were both candidates for governor. Lowell was defeated in his home county more than five to one. For this he has no body to blame but himself. The grand reception that was given Mr. Furnish upon his return to Pendleton after receiving the nomination is sufficient evidence to show his high standing in his own community. Mr. Furnish will be our next governor, and Judge Lowell is making a big fool of himself.

In this campaign the democrats of the state of Oregon will make a determined effort to elect governor and as much of the legislative ticket as possible. To this end the democrats will concentrate their forces. In this election, republicans should stand firm and on the first Monday in June go to the polls with a determination to uphold and continue Republican principles. G. W. Phelps for joint representative and J. W. Scriber for joint senator, are both good men. For men who believe in Republican principles, there can be no excuse offered for not voting for them. They stand for the Republican policy and purpose and if elected they will be in a position to help continue this policy.

THE ONE LEADING QUESTION. Can our Pacific states afford the

policy of "scuttle," as to the Philippine Islands? Can Oregon afford to give her voice for that policy? This is the main issue now before the people of Oregon. Our election, to be held a few weeks hence, will be taken by the country as the declaration of Oregon on this subject. In the platforms of the two parties this issue is distinctly joined. The Republican platform declares, without equivocation, "against all proposals looking to retirement of the United States from the Philippine Islands." Equally without equivocation the Democratic platform declares that the United States should "grant them their independence." Here is a national issue, in the Oregon election, of first magnitude and highest importance.

Democratic success in Oregon would announce to the people of the United States that Oregon had deliberately voted for withdrawal from the Philippine Islands; that her senators and representatives in Congress were expected to support the policy of withdrawal; that Oregon desires the position gained in the Orient through the Spanish war to be abandoned, regardless of the general advantages which the position gives us.

Is it for a Pacific state to take the lead in this policy of "scuttle"? Is it for Oregon to take the lead in it? Care we nothing for the vast opportunities which the possession of the Philippines opens to us? Is Oregon to declare, and be first to declare, for surrender of that incomparable station of commerce in the Orient?

The assertion or assumption that our sovereignty over the islands is incompatible with the principles of human freedom is a libel upon our own devotion to those principles, of which Americans should be ashamed. Already we are introducing self-government there, and the only fear is that we shall go faster with it than the people are prepared for it. We shall establish and maintain in the island our familiar system of territorial government, which we have followed in our home territories for a century—a system in every way comfortable to the principles of freedom.

Whether we shall retain the Philippines, accepting our opportunities and duties and making the most of both, or scuttle the islands, is the national question now before the people for Oregon.—Oregonian.

WILLIAMSON FOR CONGRESS.

"Newt" Williamson, as he is called at his home in Eastern Oregon, is purely a man of the people. His residence is at Prineville, and he has for a number of years been engaged in the sheep business and in stockraising. To see him in his home town or on his ranch one would never take the new congressional nominee for a political aspirant. In the town he mingles with the "boys," being often seen with groups of them on the street corners, and is the most common looking one of them all in dress. He generally wears a pair of overalls and a broad-rimmed hat of the sombrero pattern, and has a natural kind word for every one he meets. He is not of the stripe who go in this attire for effect, but it is natural. Mr. Williamson has spent his life that way, and he thinks nothing of meeting prominent men who visit Prineville in his overalls. On his ranch it is the same way. He can lasso a broncho or shear or butcher a sheep as quickly as any employe on his ranch, and he is not backward in taking hold when it comes to manual labor of any kind. Still, when one looks into the eyes of J. N. Williamson and sees the spark of intellect there, together with a classic, clean-shaven face and a voice naturally eloquent and pleasing, he sees in the man more than a politician.
