WILL WOOL ADVANCE? Is wool going to be higher? That is an important question, for the eastern wool trade are buying the new clip in the West at prices which necessitate a very considerable advance in the seaboard markets. The commodity has got to advance in Boston and other markets, otherwise there will be some widespread losses. The eastern trade seem to have become thoroughly impregnated with the view

that wool can be put to higher figures than have been quoted in recent months, and they have been buying in the West in a manner to indicate most unmistakably that they have the courage of their convictions. They have been absorbing wool as fast as it came off the sheep's back, and at prices which put those paid a year ago in the shade. Wool of a grade that was bought last year at a figure equivalent to 49 cents clean landed in Boston, has recently brought a price equivalent to 48 cents. Down in Texas eastern buyers have been paying prices equivalent to 50 cents clean in Boston, if not more.

We need not point out what this means. Any one who has kept track of the seaboard markets knows that it is impossible to sell wool today in these markets at higher quotations than are now being paid by the trade in the West. Take the case of an Idaho wool, for which the equivalent of 48 cents clean landed in Boston has recently been paid in the West—a higher price cannot be obtained in the markets today. Or take Texas wool. A really fine Texas running to staple might find buyers in Boston today at 50 cents clean, but it would probably be impossible to get more for it. And yet the trade here lately been paying prices in Texas equivalent to 50 cents clean in Boston. The conclusion from all this is, that wool has got to advance very substantially in the seaboard markets, in order that a profit may be realized on the purchases made this season in the West.—American Wool and Cotton Reporter.

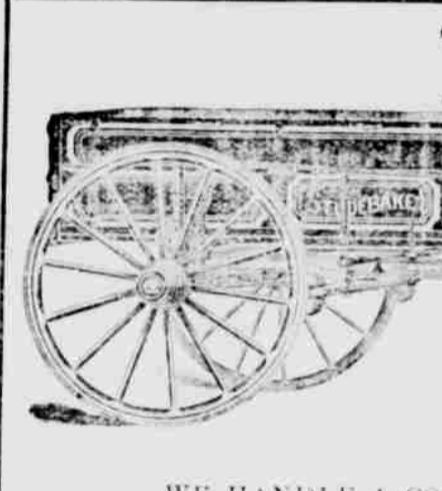

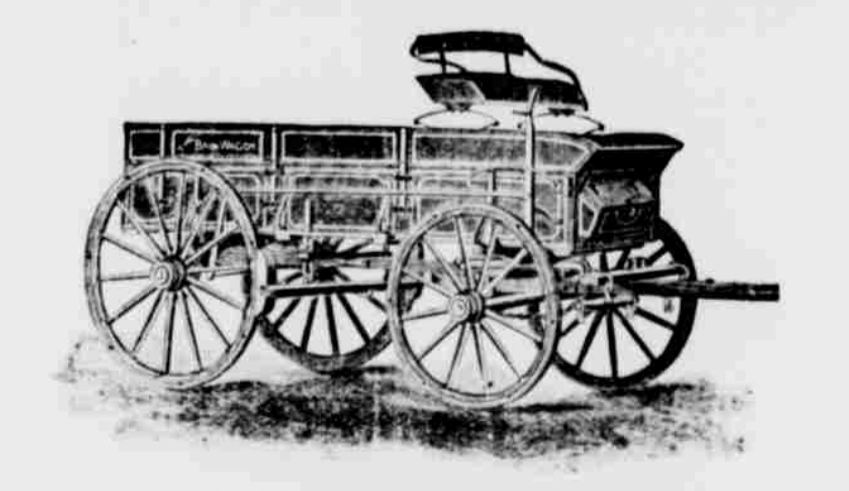
