INCREASE OF VALUES.

Morrow County Lands Double in Price in Two Years.

All over Morrow county land values are increasing, and in some localities have more than doubled in value with in the past two years. In the wheat district northeast of Ione and east of Douglas, a corporation in which the Sherman County Bank at Moro, is interested, has contracted for large tracts of land, the transfer to be made after the present wheat crop is harvested. John Harbke has sold 16 quarter sections at \$1000 per quarter. He will also get \$4,000 for his stock and machinery, making a \$20,000 sale. A number of the farmers northeast of Ione have joined with George Currin and have sold 27 quarter sections to this same corporation for \$800 per quarter. D. W. Fagaldi has also sold a tract of land in the Ione district. Less than two years ago a great portion of this land that has been contracted for at \$1000 per quarter was purchased at from \$200 to \$500 per quarter, which was considered a good price at that time. This land is being purchased for agricultural purposes, and it is understood that Eastern farmers will come out and buy the land in small tracts and farm it.

Mr. Spencer was out at his ranch on Little Butte creek when the message was received. The sheep were on Five Mile and Deerhorn creeks in the Blue mountains, in Umatilla county at the time of the shooting. Mr. Spencer had just got back from where the sheep were Sunday evening. The GAZETTE is only able to get meagre particulars at the time of the going to press. One camp was burned Friday and the other was burned Saturday, and the shooting occurred on Saturday. It seems that the whole affair was spotted where they are now since the 9th of May. No cattle are run in the district where the sheep are and there are no private reserves. The sheep have been herded there before and there never was any previous trouble. We are unable to learn the number of sheep killed. Mr. Spencer left for the scene of the trouble with new camp outfits Tuesday morning.
